SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Thank you. Back-up is rolling. Thank you and good morning, and welcome to today's remote New York City Council vote on the Committee on Governmental Operations. At this time would all Council Members and Council staff please turn on their video. To minimize disruption, please place electronic devices on vibrate or silent mode. Thank you, Chair. We are ready to begin. CHAIR CABRERA: Well, good morning. My name is Fernando abrera. I' the Chair of the Committee on Governmental Operations. We have been joined by my colleagues and members of the Committee. We have Council Member Ampry Samuel, Council Member Yeger, Council Member, Perkins Council Member Darma Diaz, Council Member Maisel, Council Member Koslowitz, Majority Leader Cumbo, Council Member Levin, Council Member Powers, Council Member Grodenchik. I believe that's all we have right now. Today we'll be holding a vote on several pieces of legislation that represents a tremendous government transparency, and civic engagement. As I always said in the past, 311 is the average New York's own lines to city

government. It is important that 311 is responsive, the city agencies are efficient in resolving complaints and that the public maintains this cross and assistance. It is also critical that the city resources wise, be used wisely especially in this time of crisis. In the spirit of making 311 work better...(coughs) excuse me... for New Yorkers, the committee will be voting on Proposed Introduction Number 1420-C sponsored by Minority Leader and Council Member Matteo, which will require the city to study their Preconsidered and anonymous 311 complaints, and determine what such complaints are more likely to be substantiated, and Proposed Introduction No. 1830-B sponsored by myself, which will require 311 to notify each city agency when a service request has not been closed within the time frame stated in the city, in the agencies' service level agreement. This bill will ensure that city agencies, which have agreed to respond to complaints within certain timeframes are holding up to their end of the agreement. I am very grateful for the Administration for working with us on this bill. This ball also consumes the upcoming citywide election. Right now the city first grand choice

election is being held in Council District 24. Early voting is underway and stakeholders across the city have already conducted many ranked choice voting trainings in town halls. Looking ahead to the citywide primaries in June it is critical that all city voters understand how ranked choice voting works and that they are comfortable with it. That is why I'm proud of the Committee on Governmental Operations voting on Proposed Introduction 1994-A sponsored by Council Member Ampry Samuel, which will require the Campaign Finance Board to take additional steps to ensure all New Yorkers understand the new Rank Choice Voting system. Thank you to my colleagues for going to this vote, to the Committee staff and then the Dream Team, Committee Counsel, CJ Murray, Senior Policy Analyst Emily Forgione, Elizabeth Cronk, Senior Finance Analyst Sadac Kanbacchi (sp?) and to my Communications Legislator, Director Claire MvLeveighn. I will let... at this moment I'm going to turn it over to Council Member Ampry-Samuel to give a statement on her bill.

COUNCIL MEMBER AMPRY-SAMUEL: Thanks Chair for the opportunity to speak on my bill Intro 1994, and

first I want to also say that 30 of us in this City Council have already signed onto to this bill, and so I just want to thank everybody for their support, and so we already know the necessity of it. Voters voted in November of 2019 for rank choice voting in New York City. That was November of 2019, and in February of 2020, I stood in front of the Board of Elections in a very small press conference, and called on the City of New York to set aside funding in the budget to make sure that we are reaching every single voter, and in particular voters that have been historically disenfranchised to make sure that they knew what was happening that they knew that Rank Choice Voting was passed and that we... there was a strategic plan to educate voters on the system itself, and that was again in February of 2020. I then introduced this bill in July of 2020, and I understand the city was going through a global pandemic, and this was not something that was prioritized because we were trying to save lives because of COVID as well as a federal election that ended in November of 2020, and so this committee heard the bill, and I'm very thankful for that hearing, but I really wish that we were able to move

forward earlier in making sure that voters were educated on Rank Choice Voting prior to today when we are clearly in the middle of a special election, and so with that being said, I just wanted to highlight just four key points of the legislation that is a little different than what we see Campaign Finance doing currently as well as the Board of Elections. One, this bill will ensure that the Campaign Finance Board distributes a post card to each and every household in New York City with a registered voter. So, that's every household would receive a post card that is not part of the standard Campaign Finance Voters' Guide that is sent out, and you have to sit through a huge book looking for information. So, this would be a clear postcard, and this bill would require that ads being published citywide in ethnic media outlets, and that's something different as well because we know that that the huge need is for people in certain communities that don't necessarily get information or there's no strategy around outreaching to the most vulnerable, and so this would require a city wide campaign within ethnic media outlets. A third huge piece of it would include information material

that is in large print working with the Department of the Aging and now just for our seniors and our elderly, but also those that are visually impaired. So the materials that are sent out to the home have to be in large print, and the last piece or it that I want to highlight is that the Campaign Finance Board shall collaborate with community based organizations such as civil rights Organizations, disability rights groups organizations serving public housing residents and organizations that serve the under-represented. And so, in closing, you know clearly there's (audio cut out)

CHAIR FERNANDO CABRERA: I'm sorry Council Member you're muted.

COUNCIL MEMBER AMPRY-SAMUEL: So, in closing (laughs) this bill is simply to codify the work that is already being done in the Campaign Finance Board as well as the Board of Elections for just to make sure that there is a strategic plan in place to reach every single voter in the city of New York, and the bill does not expire until December 20, December of 2025. So, again, thank you so much and I also want to thank Common Cause for their hard work, and every one else who worked on this bill,

I really do get a chance to do wise things and I'm happy to be a part of that. Specifically with respect to Council Member Ampry-Samuel's bill

I just want to speak on that for a moment. I am proud to be Council Member Ampry-Samuel's second co-sponsor on this and although I am known to have not supported rank choice voting and in my district the vote has overwhelmingly rejected rank choice voting wisely in my view. I think that this is the very least we can do to provide the resources necessary to educate voters as this is really coming up the pike and it's right around the corner. It is it \$2 million anticipated to cost. I am hopeful that the Campaign Finance Board God willing can be trusted to spend the money wisely, but I think it's very important that a road map be written out as Council Member Ampry-Samuel did to instruct the Board on what it is that we expect, and I hope that this experiment and this I am not very confident it will work in favor of democracy, but I'm hopeful that the best we can do is provide the resources to educate voters, and for that reason I am co-sponsoring the bill that will cost at this time \$2 million at a time that the city grateful to you and the members of this committee. Thank you for that. I vote aye on all. Thank you.
