SPEAKER JOHNSON: We're going to start with ceremonials.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Keep it down, please. Be quiet.

SPEAKER JOHNSON: If members want to come up. I invite Commissioner Silver up. Good to see you Commissioner. Good to see you. Good to see you as always. So, our first ceremonial today Council Member Chin is going to present, but before I hand it over to her, I want to just mention that we are so fortunate to be joined by some of our fantastic parks officers, our PEP officers who are here, who are Halloween of last year responded to a terrorist attack, which started in my district at Houston Street, and the West Side Highway, and took the lives of eight individuals and ended in Council Member Chin's district, and so we want to recognize their service to the city of New York, and I want to turn it over to Council Member Margaret Chin.

COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Thank you, Speaker.

I also wanted to thank Council Member Salamanca for helping to put this together, and also Council Member Grodenchik who's the Chair of our Parks committee.

It's a great honor for us to recognize the Park
Enforcement Patrol Officers who often don't get
recognized for the hard work that they do protecting
our parks, our senior, our children. So, it's really
a great opportunity for us recognize their whole—you
know, their effort at that terrorist attack that
happened last Halloween. And, as the Council Member
representing the area where the last Halloween's
horrible terrorist attack occurred, I'm happy to help
honor members of the Park Enforcement Patrol for
their bravery and courage, and to thank them
especially Captain Luz Carrion and her team who were
right there when the incident happened. And, instead
of running away, these officers put themselves in
harm's way to protect others. They were there
helping the victim, and—and it's really something
that we really need to appreciate, and we all—all of
them with that gratitude to these brave men and women
who help ensure the safety of hundreds of local
school students—local school students, parents and
passers-by. Once again, New Yorkers show the world
that our city is truly about neighbors helping
neighbors in a time of need and from the bottom of my

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2 heart, I thank you for your service. And I'm going 3 to ask the clerk to read the Proclamation.

CLERK: Council City of New York

Proclamation. The New York City Council is proud to
honor Hudson River Parks Park Enforcement Patrol

Officers for their courageous response to the October

31, 2017 terrorist attack; and

Whereas, New York City-New York City's parks cover more than 30,000 acres of land, 14% of New York City and Parks Enforcement Patrol or PEP Officers help ensure they remain a safe environment for all to enjoy whether they are members of the Park Security Services, Mounted Parks Enforcement Patrol, Mounted Auxiliary Harbor Unit, the Honor Guard or Search and Rescue, PEP Officers have distinct all-green uniforms and unique special patrolman shields allowing them to issue summonses and make arrests when needed as they patrol all five boroughs. On this occasion, it is a privilege to recognize a special group of PEP Officers for their incredible service in the midst of a very dangerous attack; and

Whereas, on Tuesday, October 31, 2017,

New Yorkers and tourists of every age and background

were going about their lives. In Lower Manhattan not

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far from the Freedom Tower, many were leaving school or work, shopping or enjoying the park and bike lanes along the Hudson. It was a day that had begun full of promise just like any other day in New York City. That afternoon, however, the day was shattered when a truck drove onto the Hudson River Park bike—bicycle path at high speed and plowed into bicycles and pedestrians indiscriminately. In the end, the act of terror resulted in eight deaths and many injuries; and

Whereas, New York City's--New York City
Parks Enforcement Patrol Officers immediately radioed
Central Communications while officers ran to give aid
to those who had been struck by the vehicle. Park
Enforcement Officers remained with the initial
victims while others followed the path of the truck
to assist additional victims in its path. PEP
Officers continued to function in support ensuring
that emergency personnel could do their jobs aiding
the injured and stopping the perpetrator; and

Whereas, at a time where our city was struck by a terrorist attack, Parks Enforcement

Patrol Officers did not panic or shy away from the chaos and disorder, but remained calm, focused and

SPEAKER JOHNSON: Thank you very much.

I also want to thank Council Member

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Salamanca for bringing this to our attention, and—and
saying that these wonderful officers should be
recognized here at a Stated Meeting of the Council.

I want to thank the former Parks Chair Mark Levine

6 who was Parks Chair when this horrible incident

7 happened. I want to thank our new chair of the Parks

8 Committee, Barry Grodenchik, and quickly, I want to

9 allow our great Parks Commissioner Mitchell Silver to

10 make a few remarks as well.

COMMISSIONER SILVER: Well, first, on behalf of the Parks Department and Parks Enforcement Patrol, Mr. Speaker and Council Members Chin and Salamanca, I want to thank you. As was stated, our PEP officers often go unnoticed. We have great heroes and sheroes in our city from NYPC and the finest and the boldest and the strongest, but we don't often know how often our peace officers and that's what the Parks Enforcement Patrol, they're peace officers. They do not have weapons. They enforce quality of life rules, but often put themselves in harm ways—harm's way. You may not know it, but they prevented kidnappings, sexual assaults, suicides as they are patrolling the park each and every day. On this particular day, no one could

imagine what a horrific event it was, and they turned
out to be the first responders, the ones that went to
the scene, and saw things that we all could say was
unimaginable. They not only went there first and
contact the other first responders, but they stayed,
and I'm very proud of the fact that they had the
resilience and compassion to help those who were both
injured and, of course, some that are no longer with
us. More importantly, I have to give a special
recognition to Captain Luz Carrion. She understood
how traumatic this event was for the officers, and
encouraged them through conversations and counseling
to ensure that they would still remain strong, and
underscore the important work they do for the city.
I thank you because again the PEP are not often
recognized. They're heroes and sheroes that patrol
all of our parks. They do an outstanding job, and we
recognized about a month ago, and I am so honored and
pleased, and I know they feel the same way that they
can be in this really outstanding chamber to be
recognized by the outstanding City Council of the
City of New York. Thank you very much for this
honor. [audience protests]

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SPEAKER JOHNSON: So, thank you,

Commissioner. So, I'm going to allow Captain Carrion

to say a few words if she would like, but before we

do that, I think we should take a moment of silence

for the eight folks that we lost on that horrible

7 day. [moment of silence] Thank you. I'm going to

8 give it to Captain Carrion.

CAPTAIN CARRION: I just want to say thank for recognizing what we do not just for that one day, but in general overall. I couldn't—I couldn't ask for a better team to be with. You know, they kept their professionalism. We, you know, everybody rose to the occasion. That's all I can expect. [applause]

SPEAKER JOHNSON: And then, lastly, I want to read the names of some of the folks that were there that day who are with us here today who are part of Captain Carrion's team. So, of course, we have Captain Luz Carrion, and I apologize if I mispronounce your name. You can correct me if I do that. We have Michelle Mason. We have Arshad Mohammed. We have Kyle Schnabel, Matthew Brooks, Christine Soto, Ashley Gopie, Malcolm Smiley, Antonique Bedward, Neferteria Walter, Cynthia Jones,

- 18 | up. [background comments, pause] Alright, I am
- 19 pleased that in honor of National Mentoring Month we
- 20 are recognizing the incredible work of Big
- 21 | Brother/Big Sister. Let's give them a big round of
- 22 applause. [cheers/applause] As a former big brother
- 23 myself, I've experienced the incredible work of this
- 24 organization up close for over 100 years, 110 years.
- 25 How old are you guys? 114. I was selling you short.

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They have been touching young lives here in New York
City now I believe over 5,000 young people a year and
research has shown and people who have been part of
mentoring relationships know this instinctively to
have a strong positive adult in the life of a young
person can change everything, and when you add it to
the services that Big Brother/Big Sis provides with
social workers and academic enrichment, it really can
be a game changer in the lives of kids and our city
is so, so lucky that we have them here as a resource.
Do I cue the clerk now to read the reso, and then
we'll hear from our wonderful CEO Hector Figueroa.
SO, Mr. Clerk, if you can please do the honor.

CLERK: Thank you. Council City of New
York Proclamation. In observance of National
Mentoring Month, the New York City Council is proud
to honor Big Brothers and Big Sisters of New York
City for its extraordinary dedication for shaping the
lives of countless young people across the five
boroughs; and

Whereas, National Mentoring Month is a time to celebrate those mentors who positively shape and influence the lives of children across the city. Whether they are family members or members of the

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community at large, they answer the call to service by mentoring a child in need and ultimately have a profound impact on the child's life; and

Whereas, through—through volunteering their time, support, love, energy and guidance, they serve as mentors and positive role models instilling valuable life skills and empowering young people to pursue their highest aspirations and realize their full potential. They are big brothers and big sisters from across New York City; and

Whereas, Big Brothers and Big Sisters of
New York city is the founding agency of the nation's

[applause] And, I would like to pass the mic to the incredible leadership of Big Bro Big Sis in New York City, the great Hector Batista. [applause]

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HECTOR BATISTA: Well, thank you Council Member Levine. I want to thank you for-for hosting us today. I want to first-I also want to thank the Speaker, and I want to thank the City Council for all your support. Because of your support over the last couple of years, Big Brothers and Big Sisters of New York City have been able to double the amount of kids that we service, 54%. We're servicing more kids now because of your support. I'm also very excited to tell you that we just recently launched a new strategic plan, and our plan has some really new programs that we're trying to launch. One that I just sent you an invitation for that. I hope you-you will come. We're launching our fist LGBTQ program where we're going to really work with young people in this community. It took me a couple of years to put that program together because in our organization even though we're a mentoring organization, we want to do it responsibly. So, we talked to a lot of people in the field to assure that we were doing this the right way, and we really believe that this population, we service kids who really use our help. As you know, they've been in homelessness, bullying, and they've been in prison, and this-these youth

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really deserve a program like ours. We're positive role models in their life. We're also going to be launching a-a program that's going to focus on the Muslim community because we service kids, right, and we don't care from what-what are the issues we really try to do programs to help that population. As you know, those youth are really having a lot of challenges here in New York and throughout the country. We couldn't do any of the work that we do without the support of the-of the City Council. a partnership. Council Member Rodriguez and a lot of the other Council Members, Rose who have been really champions of our organization, and Council Member Eugene when he was heading up the-the Committee. really want to thank you for all your support and for the recognition. I'm very lucky to lead an amazing team of people. I get credit for all the great work, and they really are very talented, and every single day they're ally helping young people find their work, and I'm going to give you a little promotion. 99% of our kids are getting promoted to the next grade, 97% of them are graduating from high school, and 94% of them get accepted into college. So, those

He became a teacher, a principal, a school administrator in the Philippines. 14 15 He went on to get a degree also from Howard University-no, Harvard. Some people think Harvard is 16 17 better than Howard. Harvard University, University 18 of Chicago and Maria College. He was convinced that 19 the roll of blacks in our history was not recorded 20 adequately. He said it was overlooked, suppressed, 21 ignored and misrepresented, and unfortunately, that is still the issue as we read about current 2.2 2.3 situations that are happening right here in our public school system. He devoted his life to 24 historical research and he did at one point belong 25

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the NAACP in Washington, but left when they refused to support his call for a boycott. But one of his most famous quotes as is listed in the book that he wrote, the Miseducation of the Negro is as follows: "If you can control a man's thinking, you don't have to worry about his actions. If you control what a man thinks, you don't have to worry about what he will do. If you can make a man think he's inferior, you don't have to compel him to seek an inferior status. He will do so without being told. And finally, if you can make a man believe that he is justly an outcast, you don't have to order him to the back door. He will go to the back door on his own, and if there is no back door, the very nature of the man will demand that you build one." Cater G. Woodson. Thank you.
