14	the Committee on Finance. At this time will all
15	panelists turn their videos on. Thank you for your
16	cooperation. You may begin, Chair.
17	CHAIRPERSON DROMM: Thank you very much
18	and good morning. My name is Council Member Daniel
19	Dromm and I'm chair of the Finance Committee. Um,
20	I'd like to welcome everyone who's here, ah, Council
21	Member Koslowitz, Van Bramer, Gibson, Cornegy,
22	Rosenthal, Grodenchik, Adams, Ampry-Samuel, Ayala,
23	Moya, Powers, Louis, D. Diaz, Matteo, and, ah,
24	Council Member and Majority Leader Cumbo is here as

well. Today the committee will be voting on one

2 item, proposed Intro 2166-B. The bill, sponsored by 3 Council Member Adams by request of the mayor, relates 4 to the city's tax lien sale. The tax lien sale is the city's primary tool to ensure the timely payment 5 of property taxes, water and sewer charges, and 6 7 certain other municipal charges. Before the lien 8 sale program was introduced the number of taxdelinquent properties averaged 4.4% over the three years that preceded the program. In contrast, in 10 11 fiscal 2020 approximately 98% of all property owners 12 paid their property taxes in full and on time. 13 is significant because currently every percentage 14 point of delinquency equates to approximately 300 15 million dollars in lost revenue for the city, revenue 16 which is used to provide vital services to all New 17 Yorkers. But while the council recognizes that it's 18 important to hold all property owners accountable, we 19 must also strike a balance to ensure that the tax 20 lien sale does not compound the financial distress 21 experienced by many homeowners, especially now during these difficult economic times brought on by COVID-2.2 2.3 For the past several months the council has met with property owners, the administration, and 24 community-based organizations to discussed the 25

proposed issues surrounding the tax lien sale 2 3 process. Proposed Intro number 2166-B and the 4 additional terms of agreement between the council and the mayor take major steps towards providing deeper protections and resources to homeowners by, among 6 7 other thing, 1) creating a COVID-19 exemption for 8 calendar year 2021 for property owners who are experiencing a COVID-related financial hardship; 2) increasing the property tax debt eligibility 10 11 threshold for Class 1 and co-ops and condos to \$5000, and the water debt threshold for two- and three-12 family homes to \$3000; 3) increasing the income 13 14 eligibility threshold for the Department of Finance's 15 low-income payment and tax deferral plans to \$86,400; 16 4) establishing a lower property tax late payment 17 interest rate for properties with an assessed value 18 between \$250,000 and \$450,000; 5) mandating 19 additional outreach sessions to be conducted by the 20 administration during the tax lien sale notice 21 period; 6) establishing a temporary task force to ensure that the city's enforcement of delinquent 2.2 2.3 municipal charges is fair, effective, and efficient, and to study the feasibility of transferring 24 properties with liens to community land trusts, land 25

banks, mutual housing associations, or other similar entities; and 7) providing 1 million dollars in discretionary funding for CBOs to do lien sale-related outreach. As we continue to make steady progress in reforming the tax lien sale program, the council members, the council remains committed to working with property owners and community-based partners and advocates for deeper reforms in order to blunt the negative impacts it has had on our communities. I'll now turn it over to Council Member Adams for her remarks, and congratulations, Council Member Adams, you've done a tremendous amount of work on this and this is a very good piece of legislation. Thank you.

much, Chair Deutsch. Thank you for allowing me to deliver remarks about legislation that is an important step forward in how we handle the collection of unpaid property taxes, [inaudible] what is imperative correct the injustices caused by the previous lien sale program and the Guiliani-esque work that has been [inaudible] get us here. We [inaudible] water, repair, and other municipal debt collection processes to a much more equitable place

2	in this bill. We have reduced the length of
3	authorization to just one year and we've added 1
4	million dollars in outreach contracts for community-
5	based organizations. [inaudible] fiscal year 2021
6	and continuing through fiscal year 2022 we secured
7	substantial wins since the first iteration of our
8	bill in December and created a robust framework to
9	enhance this vital reform. These are major steps
10	that will protect vulnerable low-income households ir
11	the 2021 lien sale and pave the way for substantial
12	rethinking and replacement of the lien sale in the
13	future. I want to thank the Speaker for his
14	indulgence to make sure that we get this legislation
15	right for communities like mine, the most affected to
16	lose their homes to the lien sale and foreclosure,
17	and I certainly would be remiss if I didn't
18	acknowledge the hard work of the advocates that
19	helped us get to this point and the Attorney General
20	James for her insight. I also want to thank our
21	finance staff, Rebecca Chasen, Ray Majuski, Amera
22	Adev, and of course our [inaudible] Council Member
23	Gibson calls her so eloquently Latonya McKinney. I'd
24	also like to thank our administration partners, Paul
25	Ocho, and I'd like to thank my director of

2	legislative affairs, Stacy Yearwood, for all of your
3	long nights, your hard work, and your dedication to
4	this mission. We've come a long way, and I ask for
5	the support of my colleagues on Intro 2166-B. Thank
6	you very much, Mr. Chair.
