SERGEANT AT ARMS: Thank you. Good morning everyone. Welcome to today's Remote New York City Council Vote of the Committee on Finance.

At this time, would all panelists please turn on your video. To minimize disruption, please place electronic devices to vibrate or silent. Thank you for your cooperation. Chair Dromm, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON DROMM: Thank you. Good morning and welcome to today's Finance Committee meeting. I am Council Member Daniel Dromm and I am Chair of the Committee. This morning we are joined by just one moment. Council Members Koslowitz, Van Bramer, Cumbo, Rosenthal, Grodenchik, Adams, Ampry-Samuel, Moya, Louis, Diaz, Matteo and Gibson.

Today, the Committee will be voting on a single item. A Resolution sponsored by Council Member Moya that would support the states passage of Senate S4482 Assembly 5092 sponsored by Senator Jessica Ramos and Assembly Member Carmen De La Rosa respectively which would establish a tax on billionaires. The proposed mark to market tax would tax the increase and value

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of billionaires assets at the same rate as other income.

Unfortunately, this pandemic has highlighted the growing wealth and equality in our state with the states 120 billionaires, seeing a collective wealth jump of 17 percent or \$88 billion since the beginning of the pandemic. This has occurred while so many of the states residents are struggling including undocumented essential workers who are barred from receiving certain assistance like unemployment insurance even as they have showed up everyday at great personal risk to take care of the elderly, deliver on meals and clean our homes.

Therefore, the Resolution calls on the state to use the revenue from the tax on billionaires to pay for a \$3.5 billion fund for such excluded workers. I am going to welcome Council Member Moya to say a few words about his Resolution. Council Member Moya.

COUNCIL MEMBER MOYA: Thank you Chair Dromm.

Thank you for your leadership in helping put this forward and thank you to my colleagues.

Of course immigrant dense neighborhoods have been the hardest hit by COVID-19. These are the neighborhoods in the communities that I represent.

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The very people that were on the frontlines taking care of us and feeding our families and keeping our city moving.

These are the people who pay taxes, contributed millions that provided relief for so many but they themselves were excluded. Healthcare workers, food delivery workers, cab drivers, construction workers, janitors, building and house cleaners and so many others.

For us to work towards a real recovery from COVID-19, means that we cannot leave behind those that have suffered the brunt of this pandemic and who contributed in more ways than one to our city and to this nation. It means the rich can't keep getting richer while New Yorkers struggle to make ends meet after not only putting their lives at risk for us but becoming ill from COVID-19, losing their jobs or even worse, losing loved ones who are the breadwinners.

New York's 120 billionaires are \$87.7 billion richer than they were at the beginning of the pandemic. They are not dealing with the heavy burden of how they will pay for rent or get their next meal. That's why I am introducing this Resolution, calling upon the New York State Legislature to pass and the

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Governor to sign to establish the billionaire mark to
market tax act and to use the revenue generated to
establish an excluded worker fund.

The imposition of this tax would raise up to \$23.3 billion in the first tax year and \$1.2 billion or more in subsequent tax years. This billionaire well tax would raise the billions we urgently need and create the opportunity for 270,000 people including 87 people leaving incarceration and 187,000 undocumented immigrants to get much needed relief after what has been a devastating year.

It is how we will recover from this pandemic equitably and with dignity and I want to thank you for joining me and ask for you to pass this Resolution. And I take this opportunity to also thank Speaker Johnson and Jason Goldman and all the folks that were involved in helping in this Resolution here today.

Thank you Chair for the opportunity to speak today.

CHAIRPERSON DROMM: Thank you Council Member Moya. And uh, we have also been joined by Council Member Powers.

COUNCIL MEMBER GRODENCHIK: Permission to explain my vote Mr. Chairman.

COMMITTEE CLERK: Grodenchik?

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2 CHAIRPERSON DROMM: Of course.

COUNCIL MEMBER GRODENCHIK: Thank you. I am generally not a fan of this sort of taxation and was ambivalent coming to the vote this morning but Councilman Moya has made a very good presentation and a very moving one at that. And I understand the great need to take care of everybody in this pandemic and that no one should be left behind.

So, with that, I will vote age and I thank him for continuing to put this before the people in the state of New York. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON DROMM: Thank you. Just before we continue I just want to — somebody has a television or a radio on, if they can mute themselves please. Thank you.
