SERGEANT AT ARMS: Thank you. Good morning and welcome to the Remote Hearing on Transportation.

Will Council Members and staff please turn on your video at this time. Thank you. To minimize disruptions, please place all cellphones and electronics to vibrate.

Chair, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON RODRIGUEZ: Thank you Sergeants and the whole team again, doing a great job to be sure that all New Yorkers are connected to these remote hearings.

Good morning and welcome to today's Council

Transportation Committee vote. I am Ydanis

Rodriguez, the Chair of the Committee on

Transportation. Today, the Committee conveying

remote to vote on proposed Intro. 2224-A sponsored by

myself, Council Member Lander, the Speaker and

Council Member Levin.

Proposed Intro. 2224-A is a Local Law to amend the Administrative Code of the City of New York in

relation to the establishments of a crash investigation and analyst unit within the Department of Transportation. The Committee heard a previous version of this bill October 24, 2021.

Every year there are thousands of crashes that goes fatalities or serious injuries. According to DOT and statistics, there were 244 traffic fatalities and 43,866 traffic injuries in 2020. Currently, the NYPD's collision investigations squad and a group of four DOT employees respond to around 300 crashes per year in which a person has been killed or is likely to die.

Over the last several years, serious questions have been raised about the units effectiveness. Many advocate for safer streets have come out in support or rethinking the way we respond to serious crashes and the bill we are voting on today does just that.

Proposed Intro. 2224-A would establish a crash investigation and analyst unit within the DOT. In coordination with the NYPD, this new unit would be tasked with analyzing a much wider range of crashes. All vehicle crashes involving significant injury. Most crucially, this new unit will take what is learned from serious crashes and turn that knowledge

into action. The new DOT unit will be required to make recommendations for safety improving changes to a street sign and infrastructure, with the goal of preventing future crashes.

It is important to understand that this bill does not inhibit the ability of the police department to pursue criminal investigations regarding traffic violence or interfere with the state law mandate that the police investigate certain crashes.

Since our last hearing of the bill, I have been having to make that even more clear, especially after we heard from all the DA's in New York City. This bill is an important step in making significant changes to the way in which we respond to crashes.

In addition, this bill will allow for victims and families or victim to receive better information on why and how a crash occurred as well as what is being done to remedy the situation. [SPEAKING IN OTHER LANGUAGE 4:07-5:05].

I want to thank Transportation Family for Save the Street and all the advocates and all the staff at Central Counsel and the staff in my office and my Chief of Staff Elizabeth [INAUDIBLE 5:18], my Legislative Director Evelyn Collado and my

Communications person [INAUDIBLE 5:24] for working so close with the Central staff of the Council who did a great job to make this bill a reality.

I want to thank Mayor de Blasio and his team for one more time showing his leadership when it comes to sitting with us, compromising, listening to what is best for the city and at the end, coming with a plan where we can pass a bill that is a good one for all New Yorkers.

Uhm, never was I at a hearing that all the parties were against it. DOT was against this, NYPD was against this, the DA's are against this.

So, yes, there were some negotiations done but again, all in secret, not letting the members know.

I tried to get some information as to what was exactly changed. We still don't have the real negotiations. Uhm, and knowing DOT how I know DOT that I can't get speed bumps in three years, to get any improvements even mistakes that they have made on turning lanes and bus lanes that they don't correct for over a year. I don't think — this plan is vague.

rock shy over New York City communities, community
boards, civic associations and residents and is
infamously unresponsible to prioritize enforcement

DOT's job performing in recent years has been woefully inadequate. The agency had failed on most basic levels to replace street signs, fix streets markings and address basic safety concerns. It takes three years on average to get a speed hump elevated to install. This is not an agency prepared to handle more responsibilities.

Let me also say that it is particularly alarming that this legislation is moving in the spirit of police reform. The DOT had trigged at communities of color with borderline contempt. While White communities got bike share and fully built out bike lanes, our communities were told to wait and then ultimately we were given punitive cameras instead.

I cannot today vote to add another \$3 million to DOT's budget and allow the agency to duplicate fresh new services provided by trained experts and professionals at CIS. We would be better served or

sending these resources to CIS to better support the work, their work.

I also note that these are the sentiments shared by all five District Attorney's and the DOT itself.

With that, I will be voting no on Intro. 2224. Thank you Mr. Chair.

COMMITTEE COUNSEL: Thank you Council Member.

The vote on Proposed Introduction 2224-A is 9 in the affirmative, 3 in the negative and no abstentions.

The item has been adopted by the Committee. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON RODRIGUEZ: Thank you colleague and thank you Speaker Corey Johnson again for all your support. In order for us to move this legislation, one more time you show your leadership when it comes to Transportation and many other issues.

With that, this hearing is adjourned.
