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CHAIRPERSON LAPPIN: Good morning
everybody and welcome to the Committee on Aging.
We're going to vote this morning on Resolution
number 7. I'm Jessica Lappin, the Chair of the
Committee. We're joined today by Councilwoman
Margaret Chin, Councilwoman Debbie Rose,
Councilwoman Melissa Mark-Viverito, Council Member
Peter Koo, Councilwoman Maria del Carmen Arroyo
and Council Member Jimmy Vacca.

The resolution that we're voting on today, number 7, would call upon the federal government to enact legislation that would authorize a one-time \$250 stimulus payment for social security beneficiaries in order to offset the loss of a COLA increase this year. 1975, those who receive social security benefits have received a modest yearly increase to their benefits due to a cost of living adjustment, or COLA, that was tied to the inflation rate. this year, because of the recession, the inflation rate remained flat and there was no COLA. the inflation rate may be zero, seniors consistently face rising costs on other fronts, such as healthcare, food, energy and housing. COLA increase would not eliminate those burdens,
but would provide an additional cushion,
especially when many seniors have factored in the
likelihood of a COLA increase to their budgets.

President Obama recently called upon Congress to authorize a second \$250 stimulus check for social security recipients to offset this loss. And as of now, there are numerous bills pending in congress to do that, or something similar.

On April 30th, this committee held a hearing on the resolution and advocates from AARP and others came and testified in support, particularly our Congressman Charlie Rangel, who gave a very passionate and effective plea and testimony that I think many of us found very moving, and really said that those of us in the Council could help him in his efforts to help seniors not only in New York but across the country by passing a resolution like this. So I'm very pleased that we will be voting on this today and certainly ask my colleagues to support this resolution and for an affirmative vote. And I would ask the Counsel to call for a vote, please.

17	The federal government says that the cost of
18	living has not gone up. They only have to talk to
19	senior citizens in our city whose water bills are
20	going up again, and who face ConEd rates through
21	the roof, rising transit fares on the buses and on
22	the subways and taxes and fees and traffic tickets
23	galore. So, this is the least we could do, and I
24	hope that Congress heeds our resolution and that
25	we get it out to anyone and everyone. So I vote
