2	SPEAKER QUINN: We're going to get
3	these ceremonials started, and if we could get the
4	Staten Island delegation, please, and the
5	Hurricanes down here, that would be terrific.
6	Thanks, so the Hurricanes who are here for the
7	ceremony, why don't you just come right down the
8	middle aisle, right up to the front, please,
9	folks. Yea. Come on guys. All right, well,
10	while folks are falling into formation, so to
11	speak, let me - a little quiet in the chambers -
12	and turn the microphone over to Council Member
13	Debbie Rose, and this is her first ceremonial
14	presentation since getting elected to the City
15	Council, so let me and who do you just hand
16	that to whoever you want to hold it.
17	COUNCIL MEMBER ROSE: Okay.
18	SPEAKER QUINN: Stand right over
19	here.
20	COUNCIL MEMBER ROSE: Okay, you
21	hold that. It gives me great honor to be here
22	today with the Staten Island Hurricanes. This is
23	a story about the brothers Barnes, Sam and
24	Anthony, who believed that the young people on
25	Staten Island needed something constructive to do.

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But not only did they need something constructive to do, and build skills, but they needed something that was going to make sure that they did well in school, provided them with support, and that they learned the value of giving back, giving back to their community. This is about a lesson in integrity, honor, and competitiveness. And I am so proud today to say - I have to read it, because this is really phenomenal. The Hurricanes, the Staten Island Hurricanes, not to be mixed up with any other Hurricanes, were the only team in New York State to have six of their teams, six divisions of their teams, compete for the national title in 2009. The Hurricanes won eight Big Apple Youth Football Superbowl championships, five American Youth Football national championships, and one New York City Pop Warner championship. And it is not only rumored but I saw that happen, that nobody wants to play you guys in this region. And we are honored also to be joined by the Little Lady Hurricanes, who competed in their first competition this year in Florida. It gives me great pride to present this proclamation, and I know my Speaker is going to give some words, but I

am so proud of Sam and Anthony Barnes, and the parents. The parents, because the components of being in this league is that your parents have to participate, that young people have to go to school and get good grades, and they have to volunteer in their community. It is a totally holistic program, and you can't ask for more than that. So Sam Barnes, thank you for your insight and commitment to Staten Island youth.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much, Council Member Rose. Congratulations to everybody, and if I could ask the clerk to please read the proclamation - that's not so easy to say.

the City of New York is proud to honor the Staten
Island Hurricanes for their recent victory and
their longstanding contributions to youth and to
the community, and whereas, formed in 2001 by
brothers Samuel and Anthony Barnes, the Staten
Island Hurricanes offers great opportunities for
its young participants to work as a team and hone
their skills as formidable contenders, not only on
the football field, but in the classroom and in

SPEAKER QUINN: (Interposing) Get quiet in the chambers, please.

Hurricanes football program provides tightly
structured professional caliber football training
for youth on the North Shore, with many of its
talented kids coming from mostly African-American
and Latino communities, such as Park Hill, West
Brighton, New Brighton, Marine Harbor, Stapleton
and Port Richmond. And whereas the Staten Island
Hurricanes football program is currently ranked #1
in the nation in the Midgets Division- -

SPEAKER QUINN: (Interposing) Yea!

COUNCIL CLERK: ... ages 14 to 16 and ranked #3 in both the Junior Pee Wee ages 9 to 11, and Pee Wee Division, ages 11 to 12. And whereas the Staten Island Hurricanes are the only team out of New York State to have the most teams, six, compete for a national title in 2009.

Additionally, to date they have eight BAYF superbowl championships, five AYF national

championships, and one New York City Pop Warner

championship. And whereas the Staten Island
Hurricanes players, coaches, parents and
volunteers have fostered great pride and respect
throughout the borough of Staten Island, and they
are all worthy of our enduring gratitude, now
therefore be it known that the Council of the City
of New York most gratefully honors the members and
supporters of the Staten Island Hurricanes for
their outstanding service and contributions to New
York City. Christine C. Quinn, Speaker for the
entire Council, Deborah Rose, Council Member 49 th
District, Staten Island, James S. Oddo, Minority
Leader, 50 th District, Staten Island, Vincent M.
Ignizio, Council Member 51 st District, Staten

SPEAKER QUINN: Yea! Sam, would you like to say a few words?

MR. SAM BARNES: First of all, I'd like to say thank you to all my cheerleaders and my football players. I'd like to say thank you to all my volunteer staff and our wonderful parents for supporting the Staten Island Hurricanes. The Staten Island Hurricanes are football, but we're education first. We have a strict rule that if

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you fail any classes, you can't participate in the
State Island Hurricanes. So we'd just like to say
thank you, and thank you to the Speaker, and this
year, 2010, hopefully we can bring New York City
another national championship.

COUNCIL MEMBER ROSE: Go

Hurricanes.

SPEAKER QUINN: Hopefully? We are expecting it, we've already drafted the proclamation, so there's no going back. Thank you all very much, congratulations. Congratulations, everybody.

Out, we're going to start the next ceremonial, which is being led by our Majority Leader, Joel Rivera. So if I could ask Chief Tom Purtell and the rest of the gang from the NYPD to come on up. And if I could ask the men, anyone from the Bronx delegation who want to come up. And just before, again, the Public Safety Chair is a good thing when you have a lot of police officers. Just get a little quiet. So just before I turn the mic over to our Majority Leader, and to the Bronx delegation, I just want to say a few words,

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because Chief Purtell, who we are recognizing today for his service to the Bronx is somebody who I actually met when I first got elected to the City Council, when you were commanding officer of Midtown North. And you know, I went into that meeting and he was playing the tough guy cop role, and he wasn't going to work with the new Council member, and there wasn't going to be any of this union demonstration thing. I'm not lying. And he very quickly, quickly, showed the pussycat that he is. Aah, ruining his rep. And I'm going to pay, I'm going to pay. Yes. But let me say quickly, quickly, Chief Purtell and I became fast friends, and he's actually a very good friend to myself and my family, and I want to say, you know, and kind of that description, I think I described the best police officer there could be. Somebody who knows when they have to be tough, somebody who has an exterior that makes you feel safe, because they look tough and you know they're in charge. somebody who has the common sense and wisdom to know how to modulate that toughness with their humanity and their heart. And it's that balance of the total human being that we see in Chief

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Purtell every time he is called out to serve our city. And I know he wouldn't want us to go into all the details, but rest assured, he has been called out to serve our city in the most dangerous and the most tragic of moments in our city. And he has said things to me like, "Well, I did X on September 11th, because it was an order and it was the right thing to do, and I never thought twice". And there's very few people who could say that in a time that tragic and that's just one example, of countless examples of heroism on the part of Tom Purtell. And we were sad to lose him from Manhattan, he did a great job for the Bronx at the time when the Bronx needed a real focus on safety to help the Bronx move forward. So I just want to thank you for all of that service. I'm so happy to have him back in Manhattan, where, in my opinion, to be parochial, he belongs. But he is somebody who is the best of our Police Department, one of the hardest-working, kindest people you will ever meet in your life, and really is one of the finest of the finest. So Joel, thank you so much for honoring Chief Purtell today, and reminding us what a great police officer looks

like, because we have one right here. He's as red as my hair after I get it colored, which will be later today.

CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Thank you very much, Madam Speaker. Now, how do I follow that introduction? I definitely won't refer to him the way that the Madam Speaker did. You can tell-SPEAKER QUINN: (Interposing) Rank

CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Yeah, rank has its privileges. You know, I've had the privilege to know Chief Purtell for the past three years and every single year, every single, you know, day we hear nothing but great things coming out from your service and what you've been able to do in the borough of the Bronx, you know, during your tenure there. And it's always been a privilege, you know, whether it's different functions, different events, or even what you do on a day-to-day basis, making sure that, you know, the people, the 1.4 million Bronxites always felt safe because we had a great New York City Police Department protecting us on a day-to-day basis. And I was sad when we got the news that we were losing you. We stole

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you from Manhattan, you know, and the Speaker found a way to steal you back. So, you know, we were all saddened because we felt we had a kinship with you and a friendship, and we know that's going to continue, even though you're going to be stationed in Manhattan, and we look forward to continuing working with you and showing that the City of New York is extremely dependent upon our Police Department to protect us, to serve us, and to make sure that we can go about our daily lives feeling secure, and with the Times Square incidents, we feel even more confident in what it is that the NYPD does. And you know, we have been working on doing this honoring for about a month now, and I said I definitely want to be able to bring, you know, Chief Purtell down to City Hall, he's done a phenomenal job. We want to bring the team, we also have ... and let me recognize who we have with us. We have our new Assistant Chief, Carlos Gomez, who joined us. He has big shoes to fill, but I hear he's going to do a stellar job, and we're going to work very well together, as we did, you know, with Chief Purtell. And I hear we stole him from Brooklyn. So Brooklyn's loss is

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2	our gain. And we also have Chief Unick as well,
3	who is working with Assistant Chief Carlos Gomez.
4	We have Deputy Inspector White with us, and we
5	also have, from the $40^{ m th}$ Precinct, Captain Elias
6	from the $41^{ m st}$ Precinct, Captain Elias Nikas, and we
7	have Deputy Inspector Donald McHugh, we have
8	Deputy Inspector William McSorley from the 48 th
9	Precinct within my district, and we have Captain
10	Kevin Nicholson as well from the 49 th , newly
11	stationed at the $49^{ ext{th}}$. So again, this is just our
12	way of saying thank you for the great service you
13	provide for us on the Bronx and for everything
14	you're doing for the City of New York, and to all
15	the men and women, you know, in blue, our finest,
16	you know, the best of the best. You know, we are
17	here in the City Council saying we stand by you,
18	especially during these budget times to say we
19	believe in the work you do, and we honor you every
20	single day. Thank you.

5	night, when the safety of our lives and our homes
6	is in jeopardy. And whereas it is important that
7	we recognize a lifelong resident of the Bronx,
8	Chief Thomas P. Purtell, who for 28 years risked
9	his life every day to help his fellow Americans in
10	the Bronx. Our community offers special thanks to
11	him, and to the men and women who protect us, and
12	who have given their lives in the line of duty.
13	They are all heroes. And whereas, appointed in
14	1982, Chief Thomas P. Purtell's career has spanned
15	nearly three decades, having served as Sergeant,
16	Lieutenant, Captain, Deputy Inspector, Inspector,
17	Deputy Chief, Assistant Chief, Commanding Officer,
18	and Executive Officer. His career has taken him
19	to the 10^{th} , 41^{st} , 42^{nd} , 44^{th} , 45^{th} , 46^{th} and
20	SPEAKER QUINN: (Interposing) Can
21	we get quiet?
22	COUNCIL CLERK: 50 th Precincts,
23	Midtown North, Midtown South, Bronx Narcotics
24	Division, and the Street Narcotics Enforcement
25	Unit. Most notably as the commanding officer of

the Special Operations Division, he led the NYPD's
search and rescue effort at the World Trade Center
after 9/11. And whereas Chief Thomas P. Purtell
is an inspirational example for all of us and is
worthy of our highest praise for his tireless
devotion to fulfilling his responsibilities to
society and for his contributions to the Bronx
communities where he worked. By honoring him we
pay special tribute to the spirit of community and
unselfishness that is such an integral part of his
character. Now therefore be it known that the
Council of the City of New York recognizes the
exemplary service, dedication, bravery and
selfless acts of heroism made by one of the
Bronx's finest, Chief Thomas P. Purtell, and
congratulate him on the occasion of his
appointment as Commanding Officer of the Patrol
Borough Manhattan South. Christine C. Quinn,
Speaker for the entire Council, Joel Rivera,
Majority Leader, 15 th District, and many other

this, I never like to be the center of attention,

but that's why I think the Speaker and the
Majority Leader knew this. But let me start,
thank you for the honor and the privilege, I'm
truly humbled to be here. I want to thank the
Bronx delegation, it's six and a half years, there
was a lot of accomplishments done, some publicly,
some not publicly, because of your intervention
and your dedication to the community. And that
has to be acknowledged also. And what I have to,
we always worked as a team in the Bronx, Kevin
Unick, Kathy White, Billy McSorley, Donny McHugh,
Kevin Nicholson, a bunch of other guys that
couldn't be here, have done phenomenal things, and
they don't get recognized, and I was just
privileged to say that I was the leader up there
while, you know, I took the ride with them. So
thank you very much.
SPEAKER QUINN: And the next

SPEAKER QUINN: And the next ceremonial, as we wrap this one up, will be led by our Minority Leader, Jimmy Oddo. Yea! Can the Bronx delegation members go over here to the right to get a picture taken with Chief Purtell? And then the folks for Minority Leader Oddo's, why don't you just fall in right over here? Come on.

SPEAKER QUINN: (Interposing) Can we get quiet? Chuck (inaudible) staff, quiet.

Thank you. Can we get a little quiet in the back?

Okey-dokey, Jimmy.

COUNCIL MEMBER ODDO: I'm rooting too, but scalp-colored. You'll never say that Quinn and Oddo don't have fun. Madam Speaker, I am very proud of the fact that I have New Dorp High School in my district, one of the great public schools on Staten Island and in the city, and led by my good friend, Deirdre DeAngelis. And today we have something I think very special. New Dorp High School has a virtual enterprise program. They have two different teams, one is the virtual enterprise law team, and one is the management and insurance. And there is something called the U.S. National Business Plan competition, it is held at Baruch College. And the competition begins on the

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local level across the United States, 500 classes
write business plans, create Power Point
presentations, they prepare an eight to twelve
minute presentation to a panel of judges. And
then those winners, the best of the best, move on
to the regionals, and then there's state
championships and national qualifiers. Well, the
two teams here finished second and first
nationally.

SPEAKER QUINN: Yea! That's great.

COUNCIL MEMBER ODDO: The

management insurance placed second, the law team placed first nationally, and that's a huge accomplishment. And Council Member Rose, Council Member Ignizio and I are just absolutely proud of you guys, and we're grateful for all the hard work. I actually visited the school a while back and met with the previous team, and it's really a wonderful thing for Staten Island, it puts Staten Island on the map in a positive light, and we are most appreciative.

SPEAKER QUINN: Well,

congratulations. We have all kinds of winners here today. Why don't we hand the proclamation to

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the folks in the middle, and if I could ask Mike to read the proclamation please. And could we get some quiet? Quiet.

COUNCIL CLERK: Council, City of New York, proclamation. Whereas the Council of the City of New York is proud to honor the participants in the New Dorp High School's virtual enterprise program for their exceptional performance and dedication. And whereas, since the New Dorp High School virtual enterprise program was launched in 2005, it has allowed its participants to create and manage their own businesses, while learning from those already in their fields of interest. And whereas the virtual enterprise program has combined real world experience with academics to provide the participating students with a valuable learning process to start them off in the professional world on a better footing. And whereas the virtual enterprise law and virtual enterprise management and insurance teams swept the top two spots at the 2010 U.S. National Business Plan championships in Manhattan. And whereas year after year New Dorp High School's virtual

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enterprise program has won countless awards for the excellent work of its students, as well as the dedication of Mr. Paul Presti, the program's teacher. SPEAKER QUINN: Yea!

Congratulations, and Paul, would you like to say something? Or the two? All right, look at that.

MALE VOICE: Well, I'd like to start off saying thank you to the teams that we have here, VE Law and Management/Insurance. was great working with you guys all this year, through all of the hard work and everything that we have accomplished, and I'm really proud of all of you, especially to Maria, the CEO from Management/Insurance, who came in second place, and no one else can beat us out. I'd like to thank Ms. Deirdre DeAngelis, our principal. She had countless efforts in keeping our program alive, and helping us along the way as much as possible, Dina Zoleo, who is here today, our assistant principal, and Paul Presti, who's made this all possible. Without you we wouldn't be here today. Thank you.

SPEAKER QUINN: Congratulations, that's really terrific. Congratulations, and the next ceremonial will be led by our Public Safety Chair, Peter Vallone.

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COUNCIL MEMBER VALLONE: Come on down, guys. Where are they? One in back. Tell him to go get them.

SPEAKER QUINN: All right.

COUNCIL MEMBER VALLONE: Everybody, I would like you to meet the famous Times Square vendors. Duane Jackson and Lance Orton. these guys did not want to be here today, it's matinee day, they want to make money. We had to convince them to come down here, because they don't consider themselves heroes. They want to get back to Times Square and do what they do every day, which is apparently sell stuff, and keep us safe from terrorists. These guys, these are the eyes, out of the hundreds of thousands of eyes that are in Times Square, these are the ones that alerted the police to the terrorist car bomb that was in Times Square. And if they had not done it - excuse me, James, thanks - if they had not done it so quickly, who knows? Who knows what would have happened? Who knows if that terrorist would have escaped? Because we know we only caught him with minutes to go on the plane. Who knows what would have happened if they had taken ... if they

had said, you know what, it's just a noise. 2 3 There's noise in Times Square, it's just a firecracker. It's just some smoke, it happens all 4 the time. But they didn't, they didn't. 5 quys work in Times Square, it's their second home. 6 7 And if you're going to mess with Times Square, 8 you're going to mess with them, all right? you. As I said, it's because of people like this 9 10 that New York City has been safe, not just in the last, during that incident, but for the last 11 12 almost ten years now. And they have set an 13 example for everyone. If you see something, say something. This is a concrete example. No matter 14 15 what you see, report it. And they may have saved 16 lives. If not in that incident, this guy would 17 have escaped and planned another attack. So as I said, they're very humble, they did not want to 18 19 come down today, I had to force them to come down 20 so that we could honor them with the thanks of all New Yorkers, which is what these procs represent. 21 22 I want to turn it over now to my Speaker to 23 continue. Oh, Dr. Eugene, Chair of our Veteran's 24 Committee. And I forgot to mention that, these 25 guys, you know, their duty to the country is not

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done, apparently, even though they're both veterans, they're still keeping us safe every day.

Dr. Eugene.

COUNCIL MEMBER EUGENE: Thank you very much. Thank you very much. I want to first and foremost thank you for your service to our nation. And you know, it is no surprise to me to see that both of you alerted the police when you saw suspicious smoke from a nearby car. As soldiers I believe that, you know, watching out for the safety of others is an essential duty. Ιt is a characteristic that is almost a second nature, you know, to you. But let me tell you honestly, I'm so proud to be here today, to join my colleagues and the Speaker to commend you, to congratulate you, to honor you today. And I think that New York City owes you a big deal of gratitude. And again, congratulations, thank you, because as soldiers, again, let me say that to conclude, you demonstrated that you still have, you still have, the spirit and the dedication to fight for the safety of our nation, for the safety of our people, regardless of your new title. Thank you very much, God bless you.

2 SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you. Well, 3 I'll just be brief so that we can have ... no, no, 4 no, I'm fine. I have heels on, so at least seeable, so thank you. Well, we've had the 5 pleasure of meeting already, but we haven't, so, 6 7 lovely to meet you and I really just wanted to 8 take a second with the rest of my colleagues to thank both of you. You know, I spoke at the Times 9 10 Square Alliance a couple of days after the failed 11 car bomb attempt, and what I said to them I think 12 you guys really embody. Who would ever have thought in the 1970's and 1980's that Times Square 13 would be a community? A community that supported 14 15 each other, that watched each other's backs. 16 That's not usually what happened when you went to Times Square in the '70's and '80's. And people 17 set out about rejuvenating Times Square and making 18 19 it something really wonderful and positive for our 20 city, and the only way you can do that is if you 21 create a sense of community on all levels. 22 actions you guys took that night are the best 23 definition of community caring for itself and taking care of itself. You saw something out of 24 25 the ordinary, you could have looked the other way.

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You could have just sold more t-shirts. You didn't. You did what we asked citizens to do to be public citizens. You went and got help, and made sure that all of the appropriate authorities were brought in to make sure nothing horrible happened. So I thank you both so much for what you did that night, and as importantly, for what you've done every day by turning Times Square into a community that supports the City of New York through its great resources, and through such a tourism industry. So thank you both very, very much, and thank you both for your service to our country, as veterans. I know we talked when I met you at the firehouse about my dad having been a Navy guy, although I think you have had a tougher assignment than he ever did, but we won't tell him that. And if I could ask the clerk to please read the proclamation.

COUNCIL CLERK: Council, City of

earned its reputation as the safest big city in

America, not only due to the support of law

enforcement, but also due to the vigilance of its

citizens.

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SPEAKER QUINN: Will you get a little quiet. I think I'm on like the sixteenth request for quiet, not that I'm counting. But I am.

COUNCIL CLERK: On this occasion, we are proud to recognize Lance Orton and Duane Jackson, two New Yorkers who acted upon today's popular slogan, "If you see something, say something", and as a result helped save possibly hundreds of lives. And whereas on Saturday, May 1st, 2010, Mr. Orton and Mr. Jackson alerted the police when they reached a parked Nissan Pathfinder on 45th Street that had begun filling with smoke, and then emitting sparks and making popping sounds. Eventually the car bomb was defused and in the end no one was hurt. With a trove of evidence still within the vehicle, authorities had enough clues to lead to the suspect's arrest 53 hours later, just as his flight was taxiing away from the gate and Kennedy Airport. And whereas Mr. Orton and Mr. Jackson are to be commended for their eagerness to alert the police to the scene in Times Square. Both are veterans who served their nation with the Navy

during the Vietnam War. Today as vendors in Times
Square, they continue to serve our nation as extra
eyes and ears for New York's finest, and whereas
Mr. Orton and Mr. Jackson serve as important
examples for all New Yorkers. They have
demonstrated true concern for the wellbeing of
others through their vigilance, and have proven
once again that acting with fortitude and hope is
more powerful than fear. They are to be commended
for their actions and they are worthy of the
esteem of all New Yorkers. Now therefore be it
known that the Council of the City of New York
most gratefully honors Lance Orton and Duane
Jackson for their outstanding service to New York
City. Christine C. Quinn, Speaker for the entire
Council, Peter F. Vallone, Jr., Council Member 22 nd
District Queens, Mathieu Eugene, Council Member
40 th District Brooklyn, Melissa Mark-Viverito,
Council Member 8 th District Manhattan, Leroy
Comrie, Deputy Majority Leader, Council Member 27 th
District Queens, Inez E. Dickens, Council Member
9 th District Manhattan, Jumaane D. Williams,
Council Member 45 th District Brooklyn, James
Sanders, Jr., Council Member 31 st District Queens,

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and every other member of the City Council.

SPEAKER QUINN: And I just wanted to say, the proclamations that we're giving to Lance and Duane today, I just want to make sure folks know that the Public Safety Chair and I went over to the stable and gave proclamations to Officer Rhatigan and Office Duffy who were the two mounted police officers that night, and also went down to the ... and we brought apples and carrots. And then we went down to the bomb squad to give them a proclamation too, and we brought dog treats to make sure their partners were taken care of as well. So ... right, cupcakes, and we brought cupcakes for all the people involved with the horses and the dogs as well. So we just wanted to really make sure we thanked everybody, and Lance and Duane, let me give you all the mic, I'll hold that for you.

MR. ORTON: I don't know what else to say. I've been on a whirlwind for over a week and I thank everyone that was involved in these various interviews with everybody, and I sincerely hope through all of this, as was aforementioned, we do have a community of veteran vendors in that

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area. The police can't be everywhere, but we're there. We're their eyes and ears. We all have to work hand in hand to keep our area safe and correct. So I hope at the end of this, the veterans of that area will have more recognition for what they really do, because it's all of us, not just us two. It's all of us. Thank you.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very

much.

MR. JACKSON: Thank you, Lance. Just ... and I always do this, and excuse me if I'm out of order. But I'd like to give a moment of silence for those men and women who are still in harm's way today, because that's what the true feeling of patriotism is, is when you go in harm's way for our great country. And if you would just join me in a moment of silence. Thank you so much. As I recall the Saturday evening, you know, I'm not a hero. I think Lance and I were just the right guys in the right place. I've said many times this week that Captain Sully, the guy in the subway, those are true heroes. We were just two guys who were very alert to our own surroundings. You know, we've both been there over ten years,

and even if the car wouldn't have had anything in
it, we would have been trying to get it out of
there, because the buses are turning. You know,
what knucklehead leaves a car in Times Square an
hour and fifteen minutes before the shows start.
So, you know, just basic things, and you know, my
hat's off, and I spoke to Chief Purtell, I've been
working with officers in the North Precinct and
the South Precinct for the last twelve, thirteen
years. We have their cell phone numbers, we see
them every day, and we've seen the different
officers come through there, Chief McCarthy, Chief
Duffy, you know, Kavanaugh, and these were
officers who came out, said hello to the veterans,
and how are you doing and what's going on. And
that means a lot to Lance and I, that we have that
type of relationship, and we hopefully will grow
that relationship in other parts of the city.
Because as Lance has said, if you see something,
say something. And I give that feeling out every
day to all the people of New York City, don't take
anything for granted. Thank you so much.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you both very, very much. Take good care, thank you. All

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right, and after this ceremonial exits, we'll have our final ceremonial, which will be led by the Majority Leader, Joel Rivera, and the Bronx delegation. And as we move, the ceremonial move over to the right a little bit, shh. If we could ask the Bronx Puerto Rican Day Parade Committee to come on up here. Why doesn't everybody just line up right here in kind of like a semi-circle type of a thing. Here you go, Joel.

CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Thank you very much, Madam Speaker. Again, I just want to call everybody's attention to another great organization that has been operating in the Bronx for the past 22 years, promoting our culture, our heritage, our tradition, you know, the salsa flavor that we have, and the Condado de la Salsa (phonetic) we have, the Bronx Puerto Rican Day parade will be kicking off this Sunday on Grand Concourse. It's going to be an amazing, amazing I know Francisco has been working very hard for so many years to make this one of the premier events that we have. And I just want to commend the leadership of the Bronx Puerto Rican Day parade for all the hard work and the dedication

that they, you know, put into this event, and
obviously to the people who participate, some
friends here who I know for a very long time, and,
you know, some people who have really dedicated
themselves to making sure they can show what it
means to be, not only from the Bronx, but what it
means to be from Puerto Rico as well. So, you
know, if I had a hat on, I would tip my hat to
you, you've done a phenomenal job, and Francisco,
you deserve a lot of the credit, I know that
you've, you know, over the past years, have
continued the legacy of Angel and all the work
that he did, you know, with founding the parade,
and you have done a phenomenal job. And with
these kids in front of us, how can you not smile
at what the Bronx Puerto Rican Day parade has
done. And I want to thank my colleagues who are
here with us from the Bronx delegation, and from
Brooklyn as well. You know, we are all, you know,
just proud to be part of this great celebration,
and tomorrow I believe is the gala, so with that
being said, can we have the clerk read the
proclamation?

The Puerto Rican 2 3 community in the Bronx, El Condado de la Salsa, 4 will share the values and traditions of their homeland with New York City citizenry at this 5 year's 22nd annual parade held in the heart of the 6 Bronx. And whereas the Grand Concourse will be 7 8 the stage for one of the Bronx's grandest events. Puerto Ricans from all ages from Boston to 9 10 Washington State, from California to Florida, will gather to highlight their accomplishments, 11 12 culture, pride and patriotism. The parade and its 13 participants help increase awareness of, and appreciation for, the Puerto Rican community in 14 15 the United States. And whereas it is fitting that 16 New York is of all backgrounds joined in this 17 momentous event and acknowledge the contributions of our Puerto Rican friends, neighbors and 18 19 community leaders. Through hard work, dedication 20 and perseverance, Puerto Ricans have improved the 21 quality of lives and community, making the borough 22 of the Bronx a better place for all. And whereas 23 the celebration of the Bronx Puerto Rican Day Parade instills a sense of pride in younger 24 25 generations who will add to their ancestor's

legacy of accomplishments. And whereas we join in extending recognition and appreciation for the history, customs and goodwill of the Puerto Rican community in the Bronx. Now therefore be it resolved that we as members of the Council of the City of New York and by powers vested in us by the charter of the City of New York do hereby proclaim Sunday, May 16th, 2010 the Bronx Puerto Rican Day Parade, La Borinquena. Christine C. Quinn, Speaker for the entire Council, Joel Rivera, Majority Leader, 15th District, the Bronx, every member of the Bronx delegation, and many other members of the City Council.

SPEAKER QUINN: Yea! Joel, I just wanted to thank you for making sure we did this ceremonial today. I want to thank everyone who worked from the day after the parade up until the parade, it's a year's event and a ton of work, and just an amazing day for the borough to celebrate itself, and also to celebrate all the contributions of the Puerto Ricans to the Bronx. So thank you all who make sure this happens every year, and every year is even better and grander than the year before. And would you like to say a

graduated from college in Puerto Rico. He
enlisted in the Army during World War II and
honorably served in the Pacific. After the war,
he married his wife of 63 years, Rafaela, before
moving to New York City with his two daughters,
Anna and Sara. Mr. Virgos enlisted and served 27
years in the Merchant Marine before joining Union
Carbide for fourteen years as a chemical
technician. One day while on the job he was
forced to jump into a tank during an explosion in
order to save his life. The incident led to a
stroke, and for many, many years he fought
valiantly and courageously until passing on on May
$4^{\mathrm{th}}.$ He is survived by his wife, two daughters, a
brother and a sister, four grandchildren and four
great grandchildren. Sara called earlier today
and asked that I add this quote when we remembered
her father. "I am who I am because he was who he
was." On May 9^{th} , 2010, Lena Horne, 92, one of the
world's greatest entertainers, passed away in
Manhattan. Lena Horne first rose to fame in the
1940's, becoming a nightclub and recording star in
the 1950's, and made a triumphant return to
Broadway in 1981 with her one-woman Broadway show.

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When she was first signed by MGM, the NAACP celebrated her contract as a weapon in its war to get better movie roles for black performers. father weighed in, saying, "I can get a maid for my daughter, I don't want her in the movies playing maids." In the 1960's Lena Horne, always outspoken on the subject of civil rights, became even more active, participating in many marches and protests. President Obama said in a message of condolence that Lena Horne, "worked tirelessly to further the cause of justice and equality." She is survived by her daughter, six grandchildren and three great grandchildren. And I want to call on our Assistant Majority Leader, Council Member Al Vann, to say a few words.

COUNCIL MEMBER VANN: Thank you.

Madam Speaker, with the passing of Lena Horne we lose a great American icon. She broke down barriers in the entertainment industry for black people and black women. She was not only a beautiful woman and a very talented performer, but also a strong black woman who stood for principles of empowerment and equality for our people. I am extremely proud that she is a product of Bedford-

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Stuyvesant, and that I was able to honor her achievements while she was still alive. She leaves behind a legacy of courage and success, and her spirit shall live on as an inspiration to young people in Bed-Stuy and of course beyond. Ι would like to comment that Lena Horne first achieved fame back in the 1940's as being the first black performer to sign a long-term contract with a major Hollywood studio, MGM. She would have become a major movie star except for the fact that she was black. And she emerged during those times when even being in a film, they had to be re-edited because there were certain states would not allow a movie to be shown with black people in She became disenchanted with Hollywood after a while and focused on her nightclub appearances throughout this country and Canada, and throughout I would like to also mention that she was a consistent involvement in the civil rights movement, and she maintained strong relationships with both Paul Robeson and W.E.B. DuBois, and of course this hurt her throughout the entertainment industry, but so be it. But I would also like to remark that in her role in entertaining troops as

so I apologize.

2	a performer for the USO, she advocated for the
3	equal treatment of black soldiers by refusing to
4	perform for segregated audiences. She paid a
5	price, the USO retaliated against her by ending
6	her relationship. She was the great granddaughter
7	of freed slaves, and again she was born and raised
8	in Bedford-Stuyvesant, attended a girls' high
9	school. She was a true icon, that word is thrown
10	around a lot lately. But in reality, the
11	definition of an icon, she meets it expertly. We
12	pay deep respect to her and to her family. We
13	thank her for her life, the lessons and the

We're voting on a number of different important pieces of legislation and

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exciting land use action. I just want to take a moment to talk about a few of them. The first, Intro 118A, which is a piece of legislation that will create a Business Owners Bill of Rights, I want to thank Council Member Brewer whose committee oversaw this piece of legislation, also Council Member Koslowitz, who was the lead sponsor of the bill, and also the Chair of our Small Business Committee, Diana Reyna who worked on this, and also the members of our Regulatory Review Panel, Deputy Majority Leader Leroy Comrie and Minority Leader Jimmy Oddo, as well as our former colleague, David Yassky. I mention the Regulatory Review Panel, because the Business Owners Bill of Rights is a piece of legislation that comes directly from the feedback we received from countless business owners, particularly small business owners across the city, during the Regulatory Review Panel. They told us over and over that they weren't clear what their rights were when they were dealing with inspectors. told us over and over that there wasn't a clear and consistent pattern of behavior when they were dealing with inspectors, and that they thought it

would be helpful if we could find ways to send		
inspectors a clear sense of what was required of		
them and try to get a message that they were		
supposed to be acting in a collegial and		
cooperative way. We believe having this six-point		
Business Owners Bill of Rights requiring that		
every inspector give it to every business owner		
before they interact will, most importantly,		
improve interactions between inspectors and		
business owners, and hopefully eventually move the		
city away from a punitive overfocus on		
enforcement, and to a more collaborative type of		
engagement that really focuses on having rules		
obeyed by business owners. And we hope this will		
also cut some of the red tape out of the process		
that business owners often complain is strangling		
them. I want to thank the staff who worked on		
this bill, particularly Matt Gewolb and Alix		
Pustilnik, and let me call first on the Chair of		
the Committee, Chair Brewer, and then the sponsor,		
the lead sponsor of the bill, Council Member Karen		
Koslowitz.		

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you very much, Madam Speaker, and certainly

congratulations to Council Member Koslowitz. It
is a pleasure for me, I believe this is one of the
first bills to go through the Committee in my new
chairship, and it's a wonderful one. The
Regulatory Review Panel is a welcome addition,
many more bills and recommendations to come from
it, this was the first. And I think all of us in
our neighborhoods have heard small business owners
complain that not only did they not understand,
but they would have appreciated some education
before they were issued a summons. And that's
exactly what this does, and I think it will
educate not only the small business people, the
community and the community board, but also the
inspectors. Because the inspectors too are human
beings, just like the rest of us, and it's
complicated to understand the rules and
regulations, and they too want to be able to
support the owners who are doing the right thing.
Thank you very much, Madam Speaker.
SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you. Council
Member Koslowitz?

COUNCIL MEMBER KOSLOWITZ: Thank you, Speaker Quinn, and I'd also like to thank

2	Council Member Brewer and Council Member Reyna.
3	Everyone knows that small businesses are the
4	lifeline of the economy. New York City has more
5	small businesses than any other city in the United
6	States, and with the shape of the economy today,
7	we in government should be doing as much as we can
8	to help small businesses. Keeping small
9	businesses informed of government policies and
10	regulations will empower owners of their rights.
11	The Business Bill of Rights will do this by
12	informing owners of their rights as they are
13	related to agency inspections. This will
14	guarantee consistent enforcement of agency rules,
15	fair inspectors and the ability to contest a
16	violation. The current system places too much
17	strain on small business owners, they have to deal
18	with too many agencies, oftentimes with each
19	agency telling them something different. I am
20	excited to have this bill come before the Council
21	today, and I urge everyone to vote for this
22	wonderful bill to help our small businesses.
23	Thank you.
24	SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very

much. Thank you. We're also voting today on an

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important landmarking, the landmarking of the West-Park Presbyterian Church on the Upper West Side. I want to thank all of the Land Use staff who worked on this. I also want to recognize in particular Gail Benjamin, I want to recognize the work of Chuck Meara and Ramon Martinez, and also the Chair of the Committee, Leroy Comrie, and thank the Chair of the Sub-committee, Brad Lander. And landmarking the West-Park Presbyterian Church, a church that is well over a hundred years old, and one of the most significant examples of Romanesque religious architecture in the City of New York, will make sure that this building, and all that it reminds us of, of a different period of architecture, it will make sure that this building stays alive, stays intact as this wonderful architectural example, so generations for decades and decades to come can enjoy and learn from what is part of this great building. And I want to in particular thank Council Member Gale Brewer, who worked very, very, very, very, very hard to make sure we could get to a point where we were able to landmark and in essence save this building for future generations

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of New Yorkers and keep it an important part of our wonderful Upper West Side. So thank you,
Gale. Let me call on the Chair of the
Subcommittee, Brad Lander, and then the Council
Member whose district the church is, Council
Member Brewer.

COUNCIL MEMBER LANDER: Thank you, Speaker. I want to say mostly that I Madam thought the process for considering this item was exactly what you would hope would happen in the city and in the City Council. As the Speaker outlined, this is a very preservation-worthy building, a real important treasure. But there were strong feelings on all sides, and it was important also to attend to preserving the spirit and the use of the building as well, and that the work of the Land Use staff of Christian Hylton and Amy Levitan and Gil Benjamin, of the Speaker's staff, Chuck Meara and Ramon Martinez, of Chairman Comrie of the Land Use Committee, of really providing a forum where everyone knew their voices were going to be heard, and where values could be listened to. And especially of Council Member Gale Brewer, who really brought the community

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together in what looked like it was going to be a very polarizing situation of two competing values, into a place where I think we can all be proud of what we're doing today.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much, Brad, and I think, Brad, you summed up Gale's work. It made it sound very simple, maybe it was simple, but it wasn't easy. So thank you very, very much, Gale. Council Member Brewer.

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you very much. I certainly want to thank Leroy Comrie, Chair of Land Use, and Brad Lander, Head of the Subcommittee on Landmarks. Ramon went on vacation the day this was to begin discussion, and came back afterwards. So I want to thank Chuck Meara. And I also want to thank ... that's an inside joke. And I want to thank certainly Community Board 7 and I want to thank Reverend Brasher and his parishioners, and certainly all the members of the West Side community and the preservation community. As the Speaker indicated, this is a church on 86th and Amsterdam, I think we all have such churches, and such religious and such synagogues and mosques that in fact mean that

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we are home. They stand for not only an historical landmark, but also a personal landmark, and certain West-Park Presbyterian Church does that. But in addition, it's been the home of very, very early worship in LGBT community, very, very early thinking about anti-war activity, very, very early thinking about ways that the community can be involved, the sanctuary that is a wonderful place to listen to both either a sermon or music. And it's a place that people feel very much at home, families. So we in the community are going to work with the congregation to restore the church, and to figure out a way that we can all work together. As Council Member Lander indicated, I think that everybody, no matter which you were on, for or against landmarking, felt that the hearing that he conducted was the first time that they could all be heard in a constructive fashion, and I give him great credit for running such a very long discussion - and it was a very long discussion. But the fact of the matter is, we were all working together, and we will continue to do so. And I hope in the near future to be able to update all of my colleagues on the way in

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which we are able to figure out a way to make this church, and the mission of the church, the church has a long mission, in terms of the way in which it supports homeless folks getting housing and figuring out ways, as I said earlier, for families to get support. Thank you all, and I look forward to an update for all of you in the near future.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much, Gale. Lastly, we're voting on Intro 123A today. I want to thank Lyle Frank and Laura Popa and Jeff Haberman who worked on this piece of legislation, and also the sponsor of the bill and the Chair of the committee it went through, Council Member Melissa Mark-Viverito. I think all of us remember a few years ago, when it became clear that a park that the Parks Department had resurfaced with crumbled rubber resurfacing came back after testing that there were high lead levels in that park. And this raised a concern amongst park users and families in our city, were we taking fields and athletic park surfacing and were we testing it and thinking about it in the right way, from a safety and environmental perspective, before we installed it in parks and

playgrounds and on fields across our city. So in
an effort to make sure the questions that were
kind of asked after the fact are asked before we
move on to new technologies and new surfaces we
can use in our parks, this piece of legislation
will create an eight-person expert advisory panel,
four members appointed by the Speaker, four
members appointed by the Mayor. They will review,
looking at safety, environmental and health
questions, all future park surfacing, report to
the Mayor, the Parks Department, the Council, as
well as all of their recommendations and findings
being made public and posted on the internet, to
make sure that the city is fully informed and the
public is fully informed, as we make decisions
about new surfacing for parks, playgrounds and
fields in the future. So I want to thank very
much the Chair for her work on this, and call on
the sponsor and the Chair, Melissa Mark-Viverito.
COUNCIL MEMBER MARK-VIVERITO: You
hit two birds with one stone with me, it's only
the Chair of the Committee and the legislation. I
want to thank you, Madam Speaker. I am very

pleased that we will be voting today on Intro

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123A, which is a bill that I sponsored and was passed out of Parks Committee yesterday. While I recognize the importance of synthetic turf to so many New Yorkers who use our playfields for recreation, I've been deeply concerned about some of the health, safety and environmental risks posed by these materials' increased usage in our public parks. In my district in particular, a field was found to have elevated levels of lead, which is clearly a very serious issue. This bill will insure that going forward the Parks Department will be presented with an evaluation of the potential dangers of any new surface materials that the Department wishes to place in our public We hope that Parks will take into account whatever concerns and recommendations are presented by members of the Advisory Committee in the interests of maintaining our fields and playgrounds as safe greenspaces for all New Yorkers. I want to thank, obviously, the Committee staff, Lyle Frank and Patrick Mulvihill, for their work on this legislation, as well as the members of the Committee. And I want to thank the many advocates that have done such great work on

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this and many other parks-related issue matters,
for working with us on drafting of this bill. So
I would urge all my colleagues to vote for this
important piece of legislation. Thank you.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much. And I just want to thank Chairperson Dilan for his work on Intro 66, and also thank Baaba Halm, Jeff Haberman and Ben Goodman for their work on Intro 66 as well. And that concludes Communications from the Speaker.

19	small step, and what we're trying to do is change
20	the mentality of the administration and change the
21	culture in terms of our agencies. The Speaker
22	dedicated a city speech to it, and we have a lot
23	of work to do. And what we have to try to do,
24	frankly, is reconcile the work of this Small

where there are increased fees and fines. And
eventually in this process we're going to have to
get to the tax policy in this city. Because if
you go to many small business owners, they will
tell you their biggest burden is their property
tax. And I can't see how we can make a genuine
effort to try to help small businesses in this
city without eventually talking about the tax
policy. So it's a small step but a good step. I
vote yes on all.
