9 to New York City Remote Council hearing for the 10 Committee on Civil Service and Labor. At this time, 11 we ask that all Council and staff turn on their video 12 for verification purposes. To minimize disruption, 13 please place all cell phone and electronic devices to 14 silent or vibrate. Thank you. Mr. Chair, we are 15 ready to begin.

16 CHAIR MILLER: Thank you, Sergeant. Good 17 morning. I'm Council Member I. Daneek Miller, Chair 18 of the Committee on Civil Service and Labor. Today, 19 we will be voting on two important pieces of 20 Legislation related to retirement, private retirement 21 savings plan, Proposed Intro 888 sponsored by Council 22 Member Kallos, would establish a retirement savings 23 program for self-employed individuals and employees 24 of private entities. Proposed Intro 901 introduced 25 by myself would establish a Retirement Savings Board

2	to oversee the city's retirement saving plan program
3	established in Intro 888. For these same employees
4	and individuals, together both of the Bills will go a
5	long way towards expanding retirement benefit
6	coverage for the city's private workforce.
7	Retirement savings plans are essential to the way
8	workers retain financial security when they exit the
9	workforce. These plans are most frequently joined as
10	part of individual employee benefits. They allow
11	employees to contribute and give an amount of their
12	income to a pension fund, then it becomes available
13	to them once they stop working. As of July 2019,
14	there are over 4 million private sector jobs in New
15	York City and a substantial number of them lack any
16	sort of retirement coverage. In fact, a 2016 report
17	found that one-third of all workers 25 to 64 in the
18	city of New York were participating in employer
19	sponsored work retirement plan at all. The two Bills
20	that we are hearing today would work to expand
21	retirement benefits for workers that are currently
22	lacking this regard. Proposed 888 would create a
23	mandatory auto-enrollment IRA program for employers
24	who have five or more employees and do not currently
25	offer a retirement savings program. My Bill, 901,

2	will create a three-person Board to oversee the
3	implementation of this program. The Board will
4	consist of three appointees who would be tasked with
5	responsibilities such as determining the date of the
6	program, entering into contract with financial
7	institutions and Administrators, establishing process
8	for employees to leave the program or individuals to
9	join the program, conducting an education and
10	outreach to employers and employees. The Board would
11	also work with the Council on investment strategies
12	and policies, although this Legislation would take
13	effect 90 days from the passage of the Bill, the
14	Board itself, would have to two years to implement
15	the Retirement Savings Program. While private sector
16	employees are usually automatically enrolled in
17	retirement programs as mandated by law, the same
18	protections do not extend to those in the private
19	workforce. So, it is important to note that these
20	Bills are not binding on workers, they merely grant
21	eligible employees and individuals an extra option to
22	participate in a flexible retirement savings program
23	while at work. As such Proposed Intro 888 and 901
24	attempt to cover a large gap in the cities workforce
25	who don't have an employee sponsored retirement

2	program. It's important to offer the city's private
3	employees this option to save for the future,
4	especially given the financial insecurities that we
5	are facing right now. I urge all my colleagues here,
6	both on Committee and in the general body to support
7	this Legislation. I'd like to thank my staff, Chief
8	of Staff Ali Desunajad (SP?), John Watty (SP?), Joe
9	Goldbloom (SP?), and Committee staff, Newsack (SP?)
10	Tom and Nevin (SP?). I'd also like to thank my
11	former Legislative Director, Brendon (SP?) for the
12	work that he's has done on this Legislation as well.
13	I'd like to recognize my colleagues that are here
14	today. Council Members Moya, Louis, Adams. I'd like
15	to welcome Council Member Dinowitz and Council Member
16	Ulrich is somewhere around. So, with that, and
17	Council Member Rosenthal, that I'd like to give the
18	sponsor of Intro 888. I see that Council Member
19	Kallos is onboard this morning, and I'd like to give
20	him an opportunity to speak to his Legislation.
21	Council Member Kallos.
22	CM KALLOS: Good morning. New Yorkers
23	should have a right to retire with 4 million workers
24	in New York City, one of the wealthiest cities in the

world with millionaires and billionaires, two-thirds

2	of our workers don't have access to retirement plan
3	through their employers. Passing these introductions
4	to create retirement security for all will do just
5	that and help between one and half million and 2
6	million New Yorkers have access to retirement.
7	Before I became a City Council Member, I worked as an
8	ERISA attorney dealing with employer retirement and
9	this is something I've been working on for quite a
10	while, long before I was a Council Member and one of
11	the reason I actually ran for office is because in
12	the Delphi Bankruptcy, GM spun off its failing auto
13	parts, paid it's Executives with golden parachutes in
14	the millions and then said they couldn't pay their
15	employees retirement accounts and that was the wrong
16	way to stabilize people's ability to retire, and so,
17	we've been working on this. Chair Daneek Miller
18	actually held the first hearing on this topic in this
19	City Council to do a study on the issue, and as they
20	did the study, we found that we could do this. He
21	did this working with our Public Advocate, Tish James
22	and Tish James actually authored both of these Bills
23	in concert with the City Council and when we lost her
24	to the Attorney General's office, we couldn't be
25	happier and the two of us have been working together

2	to carry this Legislation and to get it across the
3	finish line. I will tell you; it has been a long and
4	sorted trip. The ERISA regulations don't prevent
5	this. With that being said, we still had to work
6	with the Obama Administration to adopt regulations
7	which ended up just becoming guidance documents that
8	said we could, in fact, do this. This happened at
9	the end of the Obama Administration. We provided
10	testimony to the employee benefits, EBSA, and we're
11	able to get guidance on regulations. Unfortunately,
12	as everybody knows, we had a very rough four years,
13	and with Trump, we saw Steven Bannon in the White
14	House and from reporting, from Gotham Gazette, we
15	learned that the top ten list on Steve Bannon's
16	whiteboard was stopping New York City from offering
17	retirement to our low-wage workers, and so Trump and
18	Bannon and Congress literally took an act of
19	Congress, two of them, to stop New York City and they
20	passed House Joint Resolutions 66 and 67 by Wahlberg
21	and Rep Rooney in March 2017, signed by Trump in
22	April to try to stop States and Municipalities from
23	offering these protections. We've been fighting ever
24	since. When Mayor De Blasio ran for President, this
25	was Legislation that he actually ended up talking

2	a about in the national arena, and that helped us get a
3	hearing on the Legislation. When we talk about
4	retirement, the National Institute of Retirement
5	Security estimates that the United States of America
6	is facing a 14 trillion-dollar retirement deficit.
7	That is the difference between how much senior have
8	and how much they need, and how much is likely to end
9	up being something that the public tax dollars are
10	going to have supplement, and so, today, as we move
11	forward, under the Biden Administration, I'm
12	incredibly excited. It's also worth noting that the
13	State had said they would do this back in 2018, three
14	years later, it still hasn't happened. The Board
15	still hasn't constituted, and in this case, the City
16	Council, as often, is leading the City, the State,
17	and the Nation by doing this. The great news here is
18	that other jurisdictions are doing this. When we had
19	the hearing, Oregon showed us the way in how they've
20	been able to do it. They've seen this program
21	explode with participation from particularly low-wage
22	workers and it's been a Godsend for them. They're
23	program's only growing with minimal risks to their
24	Municipality, and it's also been incredibly helpful
25	to workers who now have a mechanism for savings.

2	This will cost small businesses nothing. All they
3	have to do is auto-enroll the folks when they come
4	in. It will be deducted from the payroll
5	automatically and it should be something that can
6	help a lot of people save, and if they choose to
7	withdraw, Oregon presents an interesting model where
8	the first contributions are actually deposited into a
9	cash saving account so that it can be withdrawn
10	without any liability. So, I'm urging my colleagues
11	to vote yes on these two Bills which are working
12	together, and I just want to thank Chair Miller as a
13	labor leader and somebody who has fought for pensions
14	for his workers at his ATU local and for his
15	partnership and brotherhood in this Legislation and
16	so much else. Thank you.
17	CHAIR MILLER: Thank you Council Member
18	Kallos. Thank you for your leadership, your
19	relentness, and stick-to-it-ness on this one as well
20	and thank you for reminding us that we were joined by
21	our Public Advocate, now Attorney General in this
22	struggle to bring retirement savings to those who
23	aren't afforded those benefits at the current time.
24	So, thank you for your leadership. Well …
