CHAIR LEVIN: Good morning, everybody.

SGT. LEONARDO: One second, Chair, one second. Good morning, and welcome to the remote Council hearing on the Committee on General Welfare. At this time, we ask that all Council staff turn on their video for verification purposes. Please place all cell phones and electronic devices to silent or vibrate to minimize disruption. Mr. Chair, we're ready to begin.

CHAIR LEVIN: Thank you, Sergeant. Good morning, everybody, and welcome to this vote on the City Council's Committee on General Welfare. Today, the Committee will vote on two Bills sponsored by Council Member Mark Levine, co-sponsored by Council Member Vanessa Gibson concerning protecting the rights of tenants, Intro 1529A and 2050A. First, I want to acknowledge my colleagues that are here. We are joined by Council Member Lander, Grodenchik, Council Salamanca, Levine, Council Member Treyger, Council Member Darma Diaz, and I want to give a special welcome to Council Member Feliz for his first

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hearing with General Welfare Committee, his first vote, so welcome Council Members. So, I'll just read briefly on the Bills. The COVID crisis has underscored the importance of safe and secure housing with the Center of Disease Control issuing guidance for a nationwide eviction moratorium has never been more apparent that housing is healthcare and human right. It is for the public health and economic priority to keep people in their homes for the duration of the pandemic, but the moratoria will eventually end, and we must have a plan in place to accommodate what could be a massive influx of new clients in needs of assistance. The Bills that we are voting on today will ensure that tenants become more engaged and educated about their rights in housing court and have access to legal services. Intro 1529A would require the Office of the Civil Justice Coordinator to collaborate with community groups in engaging and educating tenants on their rights in housing court and then report on their Intro 2050A would expand the right to council for tenants facing eviction proceedings starting June 1 of this year, instead of the current phase-in. The right to council has contributed to a

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2 30% reduction in evictions in the city between February 2019 and February 2020, and Intro 2050A will 3 expand upon this success by assuring that access is 4 not limited to Z-I-P code. I want to thank the 5 6 advocates, members of the public, and those who have 7 lived experience to testify in favor of these Bills. At this time, I'd like to turn to my colleague, 8 Council Member Mark Levine for a statement on these 9 I'd like to thank my staff, (inaudible) 10 Bills. Senior Council Chrystal Fond (SP?), Senior Policy 11 12 Analysis (SP?) Natalie (inaudible) and Policy Analysis Frank Sarno (SP?), Finance Analysis. 13

CM LEVINE: All right, thank you so much,
Chair Levin. I'm not going to give a full statement
cause I'll do that at the State today. I just want to
briefly thank you, Chair Levin for bringing these
Bills to the floor so quickly at a moment where we
face a potential emergency for tenants with an
avalanche of evictions, and these two Bills will
protect tenants in two critical ways as you
explained. First, by taking the right to Council law
to every Z-I-P code in every borough immediately,
accelerating what had been a plan, a five-year

implementation so that no tenant facing an eviction		
has to confront that with the benefit of an attorney,		
and I'm so thrilled we're pulling this off today		
ahead of the schedule and of the eviction moratorium,		
and secondly, Intro 1529, ensures that people know		
they have this right by deploying community-based		
groups throughout the city, contracted with the city		
to organize tenant so that they understand that if		
they ever face evictions, they will have protection		
by provision of an attorney, so they stand and fight,		
fight for their rights. This will be a great		
equalizer in struggles with landlords. Two big Bills		
coming at just at the right moment. I thank you		
Chair Levin. I profoundly thank Speaker Cory Johnson		
for pushing this forward and a special shoutout to my		
friend and colleague, Council Member Vanessa Gibson		
who has been my partner in this effort over the last		
seven years. Thank you so much.		

CHAIR LEVIN: Thank you Council Member Levin. Actually, Council Member Gibson would like to make some remarks as well. Council Member Gibson.

CM GIBSON: Thank you so much, Chair

Levin. Good morning colleagues. Thank you so much.

I apologize for my delay, so sorry. I am proud to

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join Council Member Mark Levine, my partner in this effort to support today's agenda items. Intro 2050 is going to significantly expand the right to council law that passed back in 2017 which many of you supported, and it really gives so many of our tenants the ability to have legal representation as they are facing eviction in housing court, and since that time in 2017, we've seen a significant reduction in the number of evictions almost 40% and that was prior to COVID, and we know that with the eviction moratorium in place, there are about 30,000 evictions that are pending in housing court. So, I think it's our best interest as a City Council to stay ready so we don't have to get ready and make sure that we are prepared for the wave of evictions that we know we will see. Intro 2050 recognizes that the right to council law five-year phase-in, it recognizes the global pandemic of COVID-19 and how it has further exacerbated so many rent-burdened tenants, many of whom lost their income and lost their employment and have fallen behind in rent. So, I'm so proud of this day. so proud of the movement from the Rights of Council coalition and so many organizations like CASA and Northwest Bronx and the Right to Council coalition,

2 the Homeless Can Stay Home coalition members, everyone that was really united around this 3 particular issue and Intro 1529 would require the 4 Office of Civil Justice Coordinator to collaborate with all of our sole community-based organizations 6 7 and community partners in engaging and educating our tenants on their rights in housing court and 8 reporting on their efforts. We know that the best 9 10 way that we can get this information out is through comprehensive education and outreach, and it's one 11 12 step for us to pass Legislation and codify the local 13 law, but we also have to take it another step to make 14 sure that New Yorker's are educated about the laws we 15 pass and how it benefits them. I'm so grateful to 16 you, Chair Steve Levin, thank you for being a 17 relentless advocate for so many New Yorkers that are 18 rent-burdened, that are facing eviction and harassment by landlords every day. We see those 19 20 faces; we know that they are our constituents and we have to do everything possible to help them. 21 2.2 thank you so much. Thank you, Council Member Mark 23 Levine, for always being a great partner in this effort. I'm so proud to call you my friend and 24 partner in this. We just need to do this ground-25

coming right on time. I enthusiastically vote I on

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all.
