SGT. BIONDO: Good afternoon, and welcome to today's remote New York City Council hearing for the Committee on Public Safety. At this time, would all members please turn on their video for verification purposes, and to minimize disruptions, please place all electronic devices to vibrate or silent mode. Thank you for your cooperation. Chair Adams, we are ready to begin.

CHAIR ADAMS: Good afternoon. I'm

Council Member Adrienne Adams from the 28th District
in Queens and I am the Chair of the Committee on

Public Safety. Today, we're voting on Introduction

2108A in relation to increasing penalties for
damaging houses of worship sponsored by Council

Member Cabrera. We're also voting on Resolution 1619

calling on Congress to pass and the President to sign
the COVID-19 Hate Crimes Act which would facilitate
the expedited review of COVID-19 hate crimes. It's

truly disappointing that we actually need to vote on
these pieces of Legislation. It's incomprehensible
to me that in the midst of a generational struggle,

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it has required such a degree of shared sacrifice and unity from so many of us. There are people in our city who would choose to perpetuate divisiveness and The statistics we heard from the NYPD at our hatred. budget hearing yesterday are staggering. example, 81 hate crimes against Asian Americans compared to 17 over the same period last year. That's over four times as many of these crimes and who knows how many more incidents of hate speech, intimidation, offensive language, and foolish scapegoating of our Asian American brothers and sisters. On top of all of that, the recent targeting of synagogues and other houses of worship is just sickening. No doubt fueled by the rhetoric of National politicians who speak to divide us for their own gain. I'm not going to say that by passing these measures, we're going to end racial, ethnic, and religious hatred tomorrow, I know the struggle will continue, and that for a long time, there will still be individuals who carry hate in their heart, but we must do something. Of course, at a most basic level, this vote is intended to send a message that anyone who damages a house of worship will face a more significant punishment, and we're sending a message

to Congress that because so much of this division has
been exacerbated by National political discourse,
that Congress needs to act, and Department of Justice
needs to help us find a path forward. But the most
important message we're sending today is that we
stand with those who have been targeted by these
attacked and with their communities, and with
everyone who feels a little safer on their way to
work or school, in their churches, synagogues,
mosques, or whatever and however they pray. We will
do everything in our power to show you that these
incidents do not represent who we are as a city. New
York City is and always will be at its core, a home
to every race, creed, and color. I hope anyone who
has heard anything out there as a result of these
attacks clearly hears the message of unity and feels
just a little more secure in the knowledge that we
see you and will keep working and fighting for you
for as long as it takes. With that, I will turn it
over to the sponsors of today's Legislation to make a
statement. Council Member Cabrera.

CM CABRERA: Thank you so much, Madame
Chair and thank for your support cause I know it
comes from your heart, and I want to thank the

2 Speaker as well for allowing this vote to come to the floor of this wonderful Committee. As you heard, 3 4 recently we have seen a dramatic increase in the number of attacks on New York City houses of worship. 5 These attacks directly against some of our most 6 cherished and sacred institutions are a front against all New Yorkers and should be roundly condemned. 8 These attacks not only instill a sense of fear in our 9 10 city, but also it creates a sense of intimidation. Our houses of worship represent the jewel in the 11 crown of New York City and deserve our protection. 12 Intro 2108A will increase the minimum fine for 13 damaging a house of worship from \$500 to \$1000. 14 15 increase will serve as an added layer of protection 16 of our houses of worship, demonstrate our commitment to supporting our city's religious institutions. 17 18 Every New Yorker deserves to feel secure in 19 practicing their faith conversely. We also, as a 20 Committee, have a duty to stand against religious persecution or attacks or intimidation and this why 21 22 I'm so glad to put forth this bill as someone whose a 23 pastor, myself. My own church has been defaced as 24 recently as just two months ago. I talked with an 25 Iman the other day, not only once, but twice within a

CHAIR ADAMS: Council Member Miller to explain his vote.

CM MILLER: Thank you, Madame Chair and thank you to Council Members Cabrera for introducing this Legislation. I just want to say to all of our Ramadan Mubarak, which is soon to be in the next 24 hours. Eid Mubarak has been around 30, around 31 days, and the holiest day of the Muslim that I've had the opportunity to travel throughout the city and fortunately for me, have not had the experience of desecration of any of the mosques that I've gone to and I'm very sorry to hear, in fact, we had what Council Member Cabrera said, we had a celebration with Chief Harrison on Monday night and it was severely, down severely from years past and that may be because there was an under reporting. I hope that that is not the case. I hope that man's humanity to man and respect and values for other's faith and culture has been elevated in the most trying time and that's what we're learning to live with in the near future, but sometimes, you cannot educate in what you

In terms of the resolution 6 on Asian hate, clearly there's no space for that, and 7 as co-chair of the Black, Latino and Asian Caucus, I want to cast this vote in support of the Asian 8 9 community, so I vote I on both. 10 COMMITTEE CLERK WILLIAM MARTIN: Thank 11 you. 12 CM MILLER: Thank you. 13 COMMITTEE CLERK WILLIAM MARTIN: Brannan. 14 CM BRANNAN: I vote I on all. 15 COMMITTEE CLERK WILLIAM MARTIN: Holden. 16 CM HOLDEN: Congratulations and thank you 17 to Council Members Cabrera and Koo and I vote I on 18 all. 19 COMMITTEE CLERK WILLIAM MARTIN: Powers. 20 CM POWERS: I on all, thank you. COMMITTEE CLERK WILLIAM MARTIN: 21 Thank 22 you, one moment. By a vote of eight in the 23 affirmative, zero in the negative, and no 24 abstentions, both items have been adopted by the

afternoon, Council Member Riley. I don't see him on.
