RABBI GERALD SKOLNIK: Thank you so much for granting me this honor. It's a pleasure to be with all of you. (Inaudible) sovereign of the universe. With humility and gratitude, we invoke the full bounty of your blessings upon the men and women of the New York City Council who bear the awesome responsibility of steering this great metropolis through unprecedented times of challenge. Be with them as they deliberate, guide them as they are called upon to make difficult and sometimes painful choices and help them to know and understand that the physical, social, and emotional wellbeing of our city's citizens rests in no small measure on the decisions that they make. As we gather together this afternoon, we are intensely aware of how very fragile all that we hold dear truly is. Like virtually every great city in the world, COVID-19 has brought us to our knees and exacted a terrible and painful price. So many of us have lost beloved family and friends, neighbors and colleagues, and beyond the human loses, we have had to witness the devastation that this pandemic has brought to our great city. Stores and

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restaurants shuttered, theaters, movie houses and museums closed, and children of all ages deprived of the invaluable education and socialization that daily school sessions provide, but as the Sanus has taught us, those who sow in tears will harvest in joy. are on the cusp, on the very edge of a great reawakening of our city as so many of the restrictions on our daily activities are shortly to be lifted. The advent of spring brings with it the promise of seeing our children and grandchildren, embracing our parents and grandparents, having a night out or in with friends, seeing a play, hearing a concert. The painful isolation of these past 15 or so months is hopefully about to yield to a rediscovery of all that makes our lives not only livable, but joyous. As we contemplate the enormous step back from the abyss, let us yet again express our gratitude to those men and women who we now understand as essential workers, whose courage in the face of this pandemic enabled us to continue living, from those who stock our food source and made food shopping possible to the men and women of the NYPD and NYFD, they let nothing stop them, and because of that, we were able to survive. Let us acknowledge

yet again the incredible bravery and dedication of nurses, doctors, orderlies, pharmacist, and all those medical personnel who battled COVID-19 in a desperate effort to save our loved ones and ourselves. Let us once again express our gratitude to the men and women who labored tirelessly and at great speed to develop vaccines that would eventually bring us to this day and treatments that are saving lives even as we speak. For all this and so much more, dear God, we thank you and ask humbly that you continue to shower your blessings upon us all, and may I conclude simply by asking one other humble request that we all pray for the peace of Jerusalem, and we say Amen.

We thank you so much for being here, for praying over us, but what I gained the most from your prayer was recognizing the mourning that so many of our colleagues are experiencing right now as they continue to do the people's work that many of our Council Members have lost parents, family members, loved ones, spouses, and so we thank you for remembering them in your prayer today. Thank you, Majority CM KOSLOWITZ: Leader. Rabbi Gerald Skolnik, spiritual leader of the Forest Hills Jewish Center was ordained by the Jewish Theological Seminary in 1981 and has served as Rabbi of the Forest Hills Jewish Center ever since. In addition to his responsibilities at Forest Hills Jewish Center, Rabbi Skolnik is involved in numerous communal activities. He is the past President of the Rabbinical Assembly, the Vice President of the Zamir Coral Foundation and a member of the Board of Directors of the Masorti and Masorti Olami Foundations. He is a past chairman of the UJA Federations Committee on AIDS, and a member of its Board of Directors. Additionally, he is the immediate past chair of JWB's Chaplin's Council and is a member of the Board of Directors of the JCCA.

He also serves on the Board of Governors of the New

York Board of Rabbis. Rabbi Skolnik nas published
numerous articles and he is a frequent blogger for
the New York Jewish League online additional with the
Times of Israel. He has lectured extensively
throughout the world and as appeared on national
radio and television. His collaborations with the
Western Wind Vocal Ensemble on The Chanukkah Story,"
"The Birthday of the World: Music and Traditions of
the High Holidays," and "A Taste of Eternity: A
Musical Shabbat, have received wide critical acclaim
These productions, commissioned by Public Radio
International and featured on NPR, feature scripts
written by Rabbi Skolnik, and read by Theodore Bikel,
Leonard Nimoy, and Tovah Feldshuh, and the Community
of Forest Hills is very lucky to have Rabbi Skolnik
as one of their spiritual leaders, and with that, I
make a motion to spread the invocation in full upon
the record.

Majority Leader. Good afternoon. Welcome to our stated meeting today. Happy Wednesday. This month we are marking Asian American and Pacific Islander Heritage Month. This is a time to celebrate the rich history and the achievements and contributions that the Asian American and Pacific Islander community have given our city, our state, and our country, but sadly, we have seen a tremendous and unacceptable

2 increase in violence and harassment against Asian American New Yorkers and this has been devastating. 3 4 Together, we must fight against all forms of racism. 5 Our agenda today includes a Resolution and a bill designed to address hate crimes. We're also voting 6 7 to reduce waste and regulate mopeds. I'm proud of this Council for fighting to make our city more 8 livable for all New Yorkers and these Bills are proof 9 of just that. I want to take a moment to wish all of 10 our Muslim friends and neighbors a blessed Eid after 11 a month of fasting and prayers, Eid Mubarak. Before 12 I delve into our legislative agenda, first I would 13 14 like to provide an update in our battle against 15 COVID-19. In New York City as of yesterday, 32,887 16 New Yorkers have died from the Coronavirus. are not just numbers, these are New Yorkers that are 17 18 mothers, fathers, sister, uncles, brothers, cousins, 19 friends, neighbors, and co-workers. We must never 20 forget any of them. I want to take a moment to acknowledge some important losses in our city in 21 22 addition to those we've lost to COVID-19, including 23 those city workers who have died on the job. Simone Lin (SP?) died working his delivery shift at a story 24 25 restaurant when the driver of the vehicle crashed

2 into his bike on April 29. He was 37 years old. This is a reminder of the dangerous conditions that 3 delivery workers face every day, and I am proud that 4 this Council soon will be working on additional 5 legislation to protect them. I also want to 6 7 acknowledge the passing of a former assembly member and former Deputy Borough President in Bronx, Aurelia 8 She was the first woman to lead the 9 Greene. Committee on Banks in the Assembly and the first 10 African American woman appointed a speaker pro 11 tempore. For decades, she served the people of the 12 Bronx and the entire city and state, tirelessly 13 14 fighting inequalities and injustices. She was 86 15 years old. I know she was a real mentor to Council 16 Member Vanessa Gibson, who I know has really been 17 mourning this tremendous loss, and I'm sure she'll 18 speak about her later, but we wanted to let the 19 public know of Aurelia Greene's contributions, and we 20 thank her for everything she has done for our city and our state. As we do at every stated meeting, I 21 22 want to remember the lives of those that we've lost 23 recently due to 9/11-related illnesses. They include retired FDNY Captain John Galvin. He died on April 24 25 29th at the age of 77 years old; retired firefighter,

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2 Shawn Kinney, he died on May 5th at the age of 67 years old. Let us pause for a moment of silence for 3 4 Aurelia Greene, Simone Lin, John Galvin, Shawn 5 Kinney, and everyone that we've lost to COVID-19. 6 Thank you. Today, I also want to take a moment to 7 say a special thank you, a big thank you to Laura Popa, the Council's Deputy Chief of Staff for 8 Legislation and Policy who is joining the De Blasio 9 Laura's work has had an enormous 10 Administration. impact on policy and legislation in the Council. 11 was the architect behind the paid sick law, the young 12 women's initiative, and plans to close Riker's 13 14 Island. She was responsible for so much of the 15 Council's work on the environment, on homelessness, 16 on food policy. She has shaped criminal justice reform, including legislation and punishment for 17 18 petty crimes such as littering and she has been a 19 trusted advisor to every speaker since Peter Vallone and all of us have valued her work and her wisdom, 20 but perhaps her greatest legacy will be all the young 21 22 lawyers who she has mentored throughout the years, 23 many of whom are still at the Council. Laura has 24 made the city a better place for all New Yorkers.

She will be sorely missed by everyone at the Council.

2 I believe she is marking 21 years at the New York

3 City Council, so I really want to give a huge thank

4 you to Laura Popa for her service to the New York

5 | City Council and to New York City. Best of luck in

6 your new position. A big round of applause for Laura

7 Popa.

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## CM RODRIGUEZ: Go Laura!

SPEAKER JOHNSON: Thank you Laura. going to miss you. We're happy for you. Congratulations. I'd also like to acknowledge and thank Sarah Gastelum. She has been a principal finance analyst. She has done a tremendous amount of work in the Council year after year, especially in covering HPD and NYCHA and she recently joined the mayor's team. I really want to thank Sarah for her contributions to the Council as well, so congratulations Sarah. We're going to miss you as well. Now, on to our agenda for the day. Out of the Land Use Committee, we will be voting on the following items: 142-150 South Portland Avenue, an Article 11 HPD application to amend a previous approved tax exemption related to a project that went through the (inaudible) to include community facility

space in the tax exemption, and this is in the

2 Majority Leader's Laurie Cumbo's District; 97 West 169th, a UDAP application to facility the development 3 of a 9-story 100% affordable building with 104 units 4 for low-income seniors in Council Member Vanessa 5 Gibson's District; the designation of the Harriett 6 7 and Thomas Truesdell House, the home of abolitionists who resided there prior to the Civil War in Council 8 Member Steve Levin's District. This will be 9 designated as a historic landmark. Sendero Verde, a 10 UDAP application and Article 11 tax exemption in 11 Council Member Diana Ayala's District, which will 12 facilitate phase two of a previous approved project 13 including 707 units of housing of which 347 will be 14 15 affordable and commercial and retail space as well. 16 There's zoning for costal flood resiliency which updates and makes permanent provisions in the zoning 17 18 text that were adopted on an emergency basis after Hurricane Sandy. It provides communities in the 19 20 city's flood plains with more flexibility to design retrofit buildings to withstand costal storms and 21 22 floods and to save on long term flood insurance cost 23 while making the city's many flood-prone 24 neighborhoods more resilient over time. We'll be 25 voting on three resilient neighborhood applications

2 in Garrison Beach, Sheep's Head Bay, and Old Howard Beach. This is in Council Member Alan Maisel, Eric 3 Ulrich, and the 48th Council District; 86 Fleet Place 4 tax amendment in Majority Leader Laurie Cumbo's 5 District will allow community facility use on the 6 7 ground floor; 68-19 Woodhaven Boulevard rezoning will facilitate the development of the 7-story building 8 with 92 units of which 26 will be permanently 9 affordable in Council Member Karen Koslowitz's 10 District. We have two property tax exemptions from 11 Finance, (Inaudible) in my District will receive a 12 five-year extension of its partial Article 5 property 13 tax exemption to preserve 2280 units of affordable 14 15 cooperative housing; (Inaudible) senior houses in 16 Council Member Brooks-Power's District will receive a partial forty-year Article 11 property tax exemption 17 18 to preserve 151 units of affordable senior housing. 19 There are also three business improvement district Introduction 2267 and Introduction 2268, both 20 items. sponsored by Council Member Danny Dromm by request of 21 22 the mayor which will authorize changes in the method 23 of assessment at both the Flatbush Avenue bid in Council Member Eugene's District and the Queen's 24 25 Plaza and Court Street bid in Council Member Van

2 Bramer's District. Resolution 1616 would set the date, time, and place for a public hearing on 3 Introduction 2291 which would authorize the 4 5 expansion, assessment increase, and change in assessment method at the Flatiron 23rd Street 6 7 partnership bid which primarily falls in my District, but there's portions of it in Council Member Power's 8 District and Council Member Rivera's District. 9 Moving on to our Legislative agenda. First, we're 10 voting on a bill out of the Technology Committee. 11 We're voting on Introduction Number 1755A sponsored 12 by Council Member Rob Holden, the Chair of that 13 Committee, both the 311 website and 311 mobile 14 15 applications have interactive map functionality or an 16 address look-up option; however, these mapping 17 functionalities do not assist the user well. For 18 example, it's impossible to select a location from 19 the mobile application unless the exact address is 20 This will require the Department of Information, Technology and Communications, Do It to 21 22 conduct an assessment of the interactive map 23 functionality through 311 website and mobile device applications that are used for the intake for 3-1-1 24 25 service requests and complaints. The goal is

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improving location accuracy of the 3-1-1 intake map, Do It would also be required to submit a report of the results of the assessment to the Council. From the staff, I want to thank Irene Byhovsky. We are also voting on a bill and a Resolution to fight hate crimes and bias in our city. Resolution Number 1619 sponsored by Council Member Peter Koo, calls on Congress to pass and the President to sign the COVID-19 Hate Crimes Act which will enhance hate crime prevention efforts at the Federal level, and from the staff, I want to thank Matthew Thompson. Also from the Committee, we're voting on Introduction Number 2108A sponsored by Council Member Fernando Cabrera which will increase the minimum penalty for the crime of criminal defacement of houses of worship from \$500 to \$1000, acts of vandalism against houses of worship in the city have been on the rise including four instances involving synagogues in Riverdale just last month. These instances are unacceptable and go against everything that our city is all about. are sending a message to anyone who would target houses of worship that would take these offenses seriously, and from the staff, I want to thank Daniel Up next, we have Introduction 2061A from our Ades.

2 Transportation Committee sponsored by the Transportation Committee Chair, Council Member Ydanis 3 4 Rodriguez, moped share systems such as the service operated by Revel consists of fleets of limited used 5 6 motorcycles, mopeds parked on the street and made 7 available to public for rental. In the last year, the number of these devices on city streets has 8 increased dramatically, a trend that will continue as 9 10 new companies have recently entered the market. have to do everything we can to make sure these 11 companies are doing everything they can to keep 12 riders safe. We all remember the tragic death of CBS 13 14 reporter Nina Kapur. This shows how important it is 15 to get this right. Currently, the Department of 16 Transportation lacks the authority to regulate such 17 systems and no city permit is required for any moped. 18 I want to thank Elliott Lynn from the Transportation Committee staff for his work on that bill, and we 19 have two Bills aimed at making our city healthier and 20 more environment oriented. First, Introduction 21 22 Number 1681A, sponsored by Council Member Jimmy Van 23 Bramer that will require the Chancellor of the Department of Education to work with school 24 25 sustainability coordinators to develop a plan for

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reducing food waste. This plan will be submitted to the Department of Sanitation for recommendations as well as the Council. This Bill would require the Department of Education to submit an annual report with information on DOE's actions to implement its food waste prevention plan and the Chancellor's updates to such plan. The Bill works in concert with Introduction 1673A, which passed the Council last month which requires all city agencies with food procurement contracts to develop and implement a plan for reducing food. I want to congratulation Council Member Van Bramer and thank from the staff, Nadia Johnson (SP?), Malcolm Buhorn (SP?), and Andrea Vazquez (SP?). Lastly, we have a Bill aimed at reducing single use plastics in our city. Each year, more than 320 million tons of plastic are consumed worldwide, and more plastic has more produced in the last decade that ever before. Plastic in landfill can take centuries to breakdown and it finds its way into our oceans and waterways each year at an estimated rate of one full garage truck per minute. Introduction Number 936A from our Committee on Consumer Affairs and Business Licensing and sponsored by Council Member Helen Rosenthal will restrict the

provisions of plastic straws, stirrers, and splash
sticks, all of which due to their size and nature of
use typically go to landfills and are not effectively
recycled. The Bill will restrict food service
establishments such as restaurants, delis, bars, and
grocery stores from providing single use plastic
straws, stirrers, and splash sticks to customers to
accommodate those who might need a plastic straw
based on a medical need, establishment must provide a
plastic straw to any customer who requests one free
of charge, no questions asked. Helen worked really
hard on this Bill. It took a lot of time, a lot of
meetings, a lot of nuances with a lot of stake
holders and I want to congratulate her for her hard
work, and from the staff, I want to thank Rachel
Cordero (SP?), Stephanie Jones (SP?), Lea Scorpiac
(SP?), and Noah Mike Slur (SP?). That concludes

CM ROSENTHAL: Thank you so much. Helen Rosenthal, Representative of Manhattan's upper west side. The Bill we're passing today brings together a tremendously diverse group of stakeholders to accomplish a critical goal which is restricting the use of plastic straws. As the Mayor's Office for People with Disabilities Commissioner, Victor Calise noted, sustainability is accessibility, and they go

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2 hand-in-hand. Three years ago, I was the first to join Council Member Espinal in sponsoring this 3 4 legislation that will dramatically reduce the use of 5 plastic straws and totally ban plastic stirrers and 6 slash guards in all of the following places: New 7 York City restaurants, bars, delis and other food service establishments. With Council Member 8 Espinal's departure, I inherited and now am the prime 9 sponsor of this landmark Bill. The coalition that 10 fought so hard for this legislation understands that 11 plastic waste is gravely polluting our oceans and 12 waterways threatening the health of wildlife and 13 14 humans alike. This plastic trash includes millions 15 upon millions of straws which are extremely difficult 16 I feel strongly that limiting their use to recycle. 17 is a simple, but important step towards addressing 18 our plastic trash crisis. At the same time, it's 19 absolutely fundamental that we protect the civil 20 rights and independence of our disability community. The ability to request a plastic straw is a critical 21 22 protection for disabled customers who need them to 23 eat and/or drink. Our disability community works closely with environmentalist, the restaurant 24 industry ... (crosstalk).

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MAJORITY LAURIE CUMBO: Please, please bring your remarks to a close.

While I'm proud to be here for the assist, getting it over the finish line, I want to thank everyone who worked so hard to make this Bill a reality, starting with former Council Member Rafael Espinal, Speaker Corey Johnson, Edward Freeman (SP?) of the Mayor's Office for People with Disabilities, Junith Enic (SP?) of Beyond Plastics, the Natural Resources Defense Council Nya Purg (SP?), and Joseph Rackaport (SP?) of the Brooklyn Center for Independence of the Disabled, and so many others. Thank you, and thank you for the extra time, Majority Leader Cumbo.

also have seen their houses of worship defaced. Over 45 catholic churches, my own church with our pastor, it was defaced just the other day. We must do better with houses of worship and protecting our houses of worship in light of the fact that houses of worship do so much for our community. I want to give a special thanks to our Speaker, Corey Johnson, Chair Adams, Jason Golden (SP?), Senior Legislative Council, Daniel Ades, and my own Legislative Director, Claude Pena (SP?). That plan 6 has resulted in that mass structures that you see 7 downtown Brooklyn which did not, in fact, follow what the intent of the plan was and was subverted through 8 devious methods to bring in the high-rise housing 9 that's presently there. To talk particularly about 10 the home that we were able to continue to fight for, 11 it was scheduled for demolition. There was a study 12 that was commissioned by the ECD to be conducted by 13 14 AKRF and that report said that it did not warrant 15 being landmark because there was no substantial proof 16 that it was any way involved in the abolitionist 17 movement. However, the report was found to be 18 fraudulent, found to contain lies, found to said that 19 they interviewed people that they did not interview, 20 and so that sort of really pulled the legs from the movement forward. There were groups and 21 22 organizations that fought, the Brooklyn Legal 23 Services, the Fury Organization, Family United for Racial and Economic Equality, and a just a general 24 25 push ... (crosstalk).

Nearly half of the American workforce is female, yet 7 gender inequality continues to persist in many forms. 8 Numerous pieces of legislation have been enacted 9 through the years to tackle some of the obvious 10 injustices, but there are other inherent hardships 11 12 for working mothers and caregiver. As primary caregivers, women tend to need more time away from 13 14 the workplace. Absence form the work place is often 15 seen as a lack of commitment and negatively affect 16 opportunities and promotions. So, this Bill would 17 look directly at putting together a task force to 18 consider cash payments, comprehensive paid family 19 leave, greater access to relief and mental health programs and so on, and it's a task force that would 20 go along with the Martial Plan for Mom's Bill that 21 22 our very own Majority Leader, Laurie Cumbo is 23 introducing for a Resolution related to Congresswoman Meng's Bill.
