2 MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you. We 3 will now have today's invocation, which will be 4 delivered by Pastor Bayer Lee, spiritual leader at 5 First Chinese Baptist Church, located at 21 Pell 6 Street in Manhattan. Welcome.

7 PASTOR LEE: Thank you. Let us pray. Father, we thank you that you are a good shepherd. 8 As a result, we are not [inaudible]. You make lie down 9 10 in green pastures. You lead us beside quiet waters. You also call us to be shepherds, both spiritual as 11 well as leaders of this free city. We are thankful 12 for men and women of this council, who shepherd the 13 14 flocks under their care. We pray for continued provision of water that is plain, food that is 15 16 healthy, and perhaps energy that will be clean, greened. Restore us our souls and guide us in the 17 18 path of righteousness as we seek to reform system that 19 are unjust. Even though we walk through the Valley of 20 the Shadow of Death, brought to us by COVID, we will fear no evil. Not only are you with us, we are also 21 2.2 thankful for the healthcare workers who risked their lives daily to save us and now to help us to be 23 vaccinated. You prepare a table before us in the 24 presence of our enemies. You anoint our heads with 25

2 oils. Our cup overflows. As the restaurants of our city prepare tables to be fully open. Keep their 3 enemy, this pandemic, at bay. Protect your city with 4 your anointed oil of healing. Bring people back to us 5 for the summer celebration. Surely goodness and love 6 will follow us all the days of our lives and we will 7 dwell in the house of the Lord forever. Keep our city 8 as a destination all who are looking for a house and a 9 home. As we celebrate the contribution of Asian 10 American Pacific Islanders to the city, we remember 11 Dr. Mabel Ping-Hua Lee. She came to the city from 12 China in 1900, when she was only 3. When she was 16 13 she marched while mounted on a horse at the 5th Avenue 14 Suffrage Parade in 1914. She became the first Chinese 15 16 woman to graduate from Columbia with a Ph.D. in 1921. She organized the First Chinese Baptist Church in 1936 17 18 and served the community and the church until her passing in 1966. With the signing of HR-4463 the 19 Chinatown Post Office was designated as the Mable Lee 20 Memorial Post Office. We pray that more people from 21 2.2 all over the world will follow Mable's footstep to make New York City a home. As women and men of this 23 council gather with renewed strength, the spirit of 24 service, grant them wisdom from above as they take on 25

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2 the challenges facing our people in this great city.
3 We pray all this in your great name. Amen.

4 MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Amen. Thank you so much, Pastor Lee, for that very timely, grounding, 5 6 and centering prayer. It is much appreciated and we are so happy to welcome you here to the New York City 7 Council. At this time I would now like to ask Council 8 Member Chin to spread the invocation onto the record, 9 10 and thank you so much for being here with us today, as well as for your service to the City of New York and 11 beyond. 12

PASTOR LEE: Thank you.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Thank you, Majority Leader. And thank you to Reverend Dr. Bayer Jack Lee, 15 16 for your powerful words. Reverend Lee is it pastor of the First Chinese Baptist Church, located at 6 Doyers 17 18 Street in my district in Chinatown. Before his theological work in Manhattan, he was the pastor of 19 the Chinese Evangelical Mission Church of Queens. He 20 has quite an impressive resume and a long history of 21 2.2 serving New York City. He has two master's degree from the Teachers College of Columbia University and 23 he currently lives in New Hyde Park. Um, thank you so 24 25 much, Majority Leader, and thank you again to, ah,

2 Reverend Bayer Lee for your strong words, and for 3 being here today. And I want to make a motion, ah, 4 that the invocation be spread in full upon the record. 5 Thank you.

We 14 will now have communication from Speaker Corey 15 Johnson. 16 SPEAKER JOHNSON: Ah, good afternoon. 17 Welcome to our stated meeting today. Thank you, Madam 18 Majority Leader. Happy Thursday. This weekend is Memorial Day weekend, a time to remember the veterans 19 20 who died while defending our nation. We are grateful 21 to those women and men and we should remember them 22 every day. It is also the unofficial start to summer 23 and we've earned a great summer. It has been a tough 24 year. On Tuesday we marked the one-year anniversary of the murder of George Floyd, an innocent black man 25

2 who was murdered in police custody. Since his death the calls for police reform and racial justice have 3 been incessant and it's a good thing. George Floyd's 4 death marked a critical point in time in our nation's 5 6 history and sparked a massive nationwide protest movement calling for change. George Floyd's death 7 will not be in vain. The city and nation's work to 8 change how we police must not end. Our city has also 9 10 seen a spike in hate crimes, including a string of anti-Semitic and anti-Asian attacks across New York 11 This is completely unacceptable. Hate crimes 12 Citv. are up 70% as of May 16 of this year, compared to the 13 14 same period last year, according to the NYPD. This is not the direction we want to go in. We must keep 15 working to end hate in our city. Before we delve into 16 our legislative agenda I would first like to provide 17 18 an update in our battle against COVID-19. In New York City as of yesterday 33,169 New Yorkers died from 19 coronavirus. COVID numbers continue to fall, but the 20 war against COVID-19 is far from over. We need to 21 2.2 keep vaccinating more, and more New Yorkers, ah, are crucial to getting that done. We need to be careful 23 and follow the guidelines to ensure that we finally 24 25 can get out of this pandemic. As always, we

2 acknowledge those who died while on the job and I'm sad to say three of those, ah, deaths we're gonna 3 announce today are May 17, Gerard Fairmein, a livery 4 cab died while he lost control of vehicle on a 5 6 Brooklyn street. He was 29 years old. On May 19 a construction worker was killed when an elevator 7 dropped in a building located in the Bronx. He was 30 8 years old. On May 22, construction worker Diego 9 Yigocota fell to his death while working on a six-10 floor building in Queens. He was 32 years old. As we 11 do at every Stated, I want to remember those that 12 we've lost to, ah, 9/11-related illnesses. Retired 13 14 firefighter Thomas Elkers died on May 16. He was 46 15 years old. Let us pause for a moment of silence to 16 remember all of those that we've lost [moment of silence]. Thank you. I'd also like to take a moment 17 18 to thank Monica Pepple for her service to this body. She has been part of the finance division for over two 19 20 years and covered the budgets of various agencies and several critical council initiatives. We wish her the 21 2.2 best of luck on her next professional endeavor. And we're also losing from my district office Carl Michael 23 Wilson, who has been just an incredible worker, 24 someone who has been such a bright spot in my 25

2 district, helping so many constituents and community leaders, working tirelessly. Ah, he has just been 3 amazing the last three and a half years, and I'm 4 deeply grateful to him. We're gonna miss you, Carl. 5 6 Now on to the agenda for today. The Land Use Committee will be voting on the following items: 7 The Governors Island rezoning as modified in Council 8 Member Margaret Chin's district; 261 Walton Avenue in 9 10 Council Member Diana Ayala's district; the Arthur Avenue hotel rezoning in Council Member Oswald Feliz's 11 12 district; 431 Concord Avenue rezoning, again in Council Member Diana Ayala's district; Sideham Street 13 rezoning in Council Member Antonio Reynoso's district; 14 15 the Acme Smoked Fish and Gem Street rezoning in Council Member Steve Levin's district; 606 Neptune 16 Avenue rezoning in Council District 48; and 300 17 18 Huntington Street in Council Member Brad Lander's district. Out of the Finance Committee we'll be 19 20 voting on the following items: An expense budget modification and revenue budget modification that will 21 2.2 implement the changes to the fiscal 2021 budget reflected in it Executive Financial Plan. We also 23 have three Article 11 property tax exemptions. 24 Ah, 25 we, actually I think it's four. We have Whitehall in

2 Council Member Levin's district, Dora Collazo in Council Member Carlina Rivera's district; 840-50 St. 3 Mark's Avenue in Council Member Cornegy's district; 4 and 38 Putnam, 3800 Putnam in Council Member 5 6 Dinowitz's district. Today we are voting on seven Home Rule messages. Ah, the first is going to reduce 7 speed limits in New York City. At least 243 New 8 Yorkers died as a result of traffic crashes in 2020, 9 10 the deadliest year on our streets since we launched Vision Zero in 2014. While speed limit reductions and 11 traffic calming measures are proven policies that save 12 lives, state law limits our ability to reduce speed 13 14 limits. Named for a 12-year-old in Brooklyn killed by a reckless driver in 2013, Sammy's Law, it happened in 15 Council Member Lander's district, Sammy's Law would 16 give New York City the authority to reduce speed 17 18 limits to 20 mph. I'm very happy the state is moving on this bill and I am proud to support it. We have a 19 second transportation Home Rule item. This one will 20 create a program for limiting overweight trucks on the 21 2.2 BQE. We're voting on three other Home Rule messages to support government workers. One will provide 23 parity among all of the Tier 2 members of the New York 24 25 City Fire Department Pension Fund from the calculation

2 of their salary bases. Another will allow certain Triborough Bridge and tunnel members to retire 3 earlier. And the third one will provide benefits to 4 certain New York City Transit employees with lung 5 disease. Another Home Rule message will allow for the 6 Department of Environmental Protection to construct a 7 storm sewer in Idlewild Park in Queens. And finally 8 we're voting on a Home Rule that will increase fines 9 10 for parked or unattended trailers on New York City streets. Moving into our legislative agenda, first we 11 12 have a resolution out of our Women and Gender Equity Committee. The council will be voting on resolution 13 14 920-A, sponsored by Council Member Margaret Chin, urging the United States Congress and the New York 15 16 State Legislature to support a woman's right to abortion and to oppose a ban on sex-selective 17 18 abortions, which perpetuate racial stereotypes and undermine access to care. And from the staff I want 19 to thank Chloe Rivera and Brenda McKinney. Today 20 we're voting on a bill to curb pregnancy-related 21 2.2 deaths. Introduction number 2042-A, sponsored by Council Member Vanessa Gibson out of the Committee on 23 Health, will require the Department of Health and 24 Mental Hygiene to post information about licensed 25

2 midwives, including the services they offer and how to find them on its website. More women in the United 3 States die of pregnancy-related complications than any 4 other developed country and the number of maternal 5 6 deaths have been increasing. Even more disturbing is the disproportionate impact on black women. 7 In New York City black women die at a rate of eight to 12 8 times more frequently than white women. 9 Data shows that one possible solution to address maternal 10 morbidity is the use of midwives. However, 11 12 information about midwives can be difficult to find and this legislation will help fix that. From the 13 14 staff I want to thank Harbani Ahuja, Sarah Liss, and Em Belken. Next, we have two bills out of the Public 15 16 Housing Committee to help senior New Yorkers. Introduction number 1827-A, sponsored by Council 17 18 Member Alicka Ampry-Samuel, will establish a public housing liaison within the Department for the Aging. 19 20 The liaison will be responsible for, among other things, coordinating with NYCHA about facilities and 21 2.2 other matters impacting older adults in NYCHA, assisting with complaints and grievances regarding 23 senior centers located on NYCHA property, and making 24 recommendations to the commissioner of DFTA on how to 25

2 improve programs and facilities for participants of DFTA-contracted senior centers at these locations. 3 Given that DFTA-contracted senior centers have 4 remained closed for indoor programming in response to 5 the COVID-19 pandemic, there is a greater need to 6 ensure that when their doors do reopen, we hope it's 7 soon, services are provided in a clear, efficient, and 8 effective manner. And I want to thank from the staff 9 Audrey Song, she worked on this bill and the next bill 10 that I'm gonna speak of. Also from the Committee on 11 12 Public Housing we're voting on Introduction number 415-A, sponsored by Council Member Margaret Chin. 13 14 Again, the New York City Department for the Aging is required by state and federal law to provide various 15 16 services to seniors, including access to nutrition, benefits counseling, employment opportunities, legal 17 18 assistance, and in-home services. One way DFTA provides these services is through DFTA-contracted 19 senior centers. It has been reported, however, that 20 it is unclear who is responsible for receiving and 21 2.2 addressing complaints about DFTA-contracted senior centers at these locations, particularly complaints 23 concerning the facilities rather than merely the 24 programming. In 2018 the council enacted Local Law 25

2 140, requiring DFTA to provide annual reports about senior centers receiving DFTA funding, including, but 3 not limited to, information on participate attendance, 4 services, budgets, meals, costs, rates of utilization, 5 and other services at senior centers. This bill seeks 6 to increase the amount of information available about 7 8 DFTA-contracted senior centers located on property 9 owned by NYCHA. And, again, thank you to Audrey Song 10 for her work on that bill. Up next we have two bills seeking to reduce eyesores from our streets. 11 Introduction number 1128-A, sponsored by Council 12 Member Bob Holden out of the Housing and Buildings 13 14 Committee, would require that where construction work has been stopped for at least two years the green 15 16 wooden fence on the site be replaced with a chain link fence. And I want to Janin Zilka for her work on that 17 18 bill. And from the Transportation Committee we're voting on Introduction number 176-A, sponsored by 19 Council Member Alan Maisel. This bill will establish 20 an interagency task force to examine the city's 21 2.2 procedures for moving vehicles that are abandoned or parked without a license plate or valid registration 23 from the streets of the city. And from the staff I 24 want to thank Jessica Steinberg Albin and Elliot Lin. 25

2 Today we're gonna be voting on a bill that is one of the biggest and most important things we can do to 3 combat homelessness. Introduction number 146-C, 4 sponsored by Council Member Steve Levin, out of the 5 General Welfare Committee, will help move New Yorkers 6 out of the shelter system and into permanent housing. 7 Homeless New Yorkers and advocates have called for the 8 current city's Rental Assistance Voucher Program as 9 insufficient. 10 We are taking steps to fix that. We're voting to increase the amount the program pays, 11 12 which will increase the number of apartments available to individuals and families with vouchers. 13 By 14 increasing the amount the voucher pays the city would 15 increase the number of units available to individuals 16 and families with vouchers. The bill will remove time limits on the amount of time where an otherwise 17 18 qualifying recipient of rental assistance vouchers established by the Department of Social Services would 19 20 receive the voucher. Ah, the, this is an extraordinarily important bill. I want to 21 2.2 congratulate Steve. Ah, I want to thank from the staff Aminta Kilawan, Crystal Pond, Natalie Amari, and 23 Louis Cholden Brown. That concludes our legislative 24

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2 agenda and with that I turn it back to you, Madam 3 Majority Leader.

4 MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you, Speaker Johnson. We will now move into discussion of 5 general orders. We will recognize council members who 6 wish to speak by using the raise hand function in 7 Zoom. Please wait before you begin your remarks for 8 our Sergeant at Arms to announce he has begun the 9 countdown clock. The Sergeant at Arms will alert you 10 when your time has expired. Mr. Parliamentarian, are 11 12 there any members who wish to speak at this time? 13 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Yes, Madam Majority Leader. Council Member Chin. 14 15 MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Council Member 16 Chin, you may begin. 17 COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Thank you. SERGEANT AT ARMS: Time starts now. 18 COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Thank you, Madam 19 20 Majority Leader. I wanted to speak on the Governors Island rezoning. And I first of all wanted to really 21 2.2 thank my colleagues, ah, my, my speaker, um, for really pushing this forward and supporting it, and, 23 and my colleague, ah, Council Member Moya, for holding 24 the subcommittee hearing for so many, many, many 25

2 hours. You know, every time my district have a rezoning, ah, it comes in his committee and all the 3 committee member and also, ah, the Land Use chair, 4 Council Member Salamanca. Um, Governors Island is a 5 6 treasure for the city, not even though it's located in my district. Everyone enjoys it and it's a gem. 7 And one of this rezoning that we were able to do is that 8 we protected, ah, the parkland [inaudible] and 9 10 expanded open space, and I've heard, you know, from constituent, from stakeholder, ah, the community 11 board, the borough president, um, they want to be able 12 to preserve this beautiful space. But Governors 13 14 Island also, was also meant to be mixed use so that it can, ah, help sustain itself. It takes a lot of 15 resources and money to restore all those historic 16 buildings on the island that provide a lot of great 17 18 diverse cultural program, ah, for the city, but also we have a wonderful Harbor School that is, has a real 19 20 diverse population of high student coming from all borough and they will have an opportunity to expand 21 2.2 the school, the new expansion, will have a gym and, guess what? A pool. I mean, the kids need to learn 23 how to swim and they want to go diving, you know, for 24

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2 oysters and, and fixing up our harbor. And on the 3 island we have composting where we support...

SERGEANT AT ARMS: Time expired.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: ... and this is, ah, so these are all the things that Earth Matter, they'll 6 be able to stay there and expand, ah, and all the 7 wonderful thing that there's and expanding ferry 8 service, and I really urge my colleague to take the 9 time to visit the island and see how much open and 10 green space there are and you could just walk around 11 12 the island and really look at the waterfront, look at the Statue of Liberty, and really help us make sure 13 Governors Island will be sustainable for the future 14 15 generation. So I really urge my colleagues to 16 support. Thank you.

17 MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you, 18 Council Member Chin, and I look forward to experiencing Governors Island with you. Are there any 19 other members who wish to speak at this time? 20 21 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Yes. Council Member 2.2 Yeger, followed by Council Member Feliz. 23 MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Council Member Yeger, you may begin. 24 SERGEANT AT ARMS: Time starts now. 25

2 COUNCIL MEMBER YEGER: Appreciate that, thank you very much, ah, Madam President. 3 I wasn't sure I was going to speak on this topic here today, 4 um, but I'm grateful for the speaker's words of 5 6 comfort and you sort of put this on the agenda. Ah, earlier today I thought of former Councilman Lou 7 Fidler, who would have been 65 today, and I can 8 imagine if I said nothing he might have himself shown 9 up, so here we are. The last time I rose in this body 10 on this topic we were gathered in our chamber 16 11 12 months ago. And I supposes as we look back to before the pandemic of COVID reared its ugly head the 13 14 pandemic of anti-Semitism was very much ravaging our society and our city. And on that day I asked those 15 16 of you who market the us versus them messaging about Orthodox Jews to stop, to stop painting us as 17 18 backwards members of society who are in need of your specialized version of cure, to heal us from our 19 20 backwards ways. I asked you to stop your obsession with our yeshivas, stop shining your cameras in our 21 2.2 neighborhoods, the ones you bring to display your notion of an awkward backwardness of our people. 23 Ι asked you to do this. I asked you not to give us 24 25 tolerance, an offensive term as if the notion of our

2 existence is one that has to be told, but to give the acceptance that every single other community in this 3 city and this nation gets to have. I asked you stop 4 associating with the most heinous of anti-Semites and 5 activist politics, to stop giving them aid and 6 comfort, to stop amplifying their hurtful words, their 7 lies, to stop accepting their endorsements, as if 8 their endorsements are of value. And here we are 9 Those of you who are responsible, and to be 10 again. sure it's not all of you, but it is some of you and 11 you know who you are, and you are oh so comfortable as 12 your predecessors in history have been with 13 14 associating yourselves with anti-Semitism. And when the verbal pogroms, such as were in this chamber, led 15 16 to the physical pogroms, such as we see on the streets of New York City, don't raise your hands in shock and 17 18 tell us that you stand with us. Raise your voices and shun the anti-Semites with whom you stand. 19 This is not difficult. What's difficult is looking you in 20 yours eyes as you send your I stand with the Jews 21 2.2 tweets, and that's just those of you have bothered to even do that much. When Pastor Lee quoted from 23 Chapter 23 of the Book of Psalms, as we call it by its 24 25 original name, Tehillim, to be sure it is apropos to

2 say that to be a Jew in New York today may indeed be walking through the Valley of the Shadow of Death. 3 And yes, the Lord may be with us for sure, but that 4 doesn't mean we have to accept walking through the 5 6 Valley of the Shadow of Death. Thank you. 7 MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you, Council Member Yeger. Council Member Feliz. 8 SERGEANT AT ARMS: Time starts now. 9 10 COUNCIL MEMBER FELIZ: Thank you, um, Madam Majority Leader. I wanted to speak about the 11 Arthur Avenue hotel proposal. I proudly support the 12 Arthur Avenue hotel proposal, a proposal that so many 13 people in the 15th Council District are so excited 14 about. The application will allow the construction of 15 a 13-story hotel as well as a residential development 16 in the Arthur Avenue in the 15th Council District that 17 18 I so proudly represent. Arthur Avenue is a vibrant community in the Bronx. It's been like that for a 19 20 long time. It's home to the best restaurants in the City of New York. It's also the neighbor of the 21 2.2 greatest attractions in our nation, including the Bronx Zoo and the Botanical Garden, ah, two 23 institutions that are heavily visited by people from 24 25 everywhere in the world, and also are walking distance

from Arthur Avenue. However, there is a need for 2 hotels in the area so that we can create an 3 opportunity of ensuring that people that visit our 4 neighborhood can maybe stay for another day. Ah, the 5 6 more people staying, ah, the more business can be done in our community and the more economic activity in the 7 area the more people in the area are employed and the 8 better local businesses can do. Ah, this is a project 9 that is highly supported by everyone in our community, 10 supported by local businesses, supported by local 11 residents, many of whom are employed by local 12 businesses, and this is a good project for the, ah, 13 14 Arthur Avenue area in the Bronx, ah, in the 15th 15 Council District. It's a project that will help 16 ensure that Arthur Avenue continues to remain the vibrant neighborhood that it is, ah, for many years 17 18 and many decades to come. Ah, for these reason I 19 proudly support the proposal and encourage all my 20 colleagues to support it as well. And I want to take a minute to thank the applicants, ah, Harry and his 21 2.2 team, for being committed to the Bronx and also being a very good fried, ah, to the Bronx. Thank you. 23 24

Although I 4 introduced this legislation in 2019, the need became 5 extremely apparent during COVID. Our seniors were and 6 continue to be one of the most effective populations. 7 A dedicated liaison would circumvent miscommunication 8 and lack of communication and lack of information. 9 Thank you, Speaker Johnson, for your support, and the 10 cosponsors and Chair Chin for all of your ongoing 11 12 dedication to our seniors, and I encourage my colleagues to vote in support of this bill. Marion Sims, whom we all know had abusive 11 experimentation on reproductive procedures on the 12 enslaved African women that he had. SERGEANT AT ARMS: Time starts now. 2 3 COUNCIL MEMBER GIBSON: Thank you, Madam Majority Leader. Good afternoon, Speaker, and all my 4 colleague. I am proud to speak on my bill, Intro 5 6 2042, on today's agenda, that would require the Department of Health to post information about 7 licensed midwives, including the services they offer, 8 how to find them, and offer them on its website. 9 Ιt 10 is truly and understatement to say that black women in our city are in a maternal crisis. It is truly a 11 12 state-of-the-art of emergency. Black women are eight to 12 times more likely than other women in New York 13 City to die from maternal complications. High rates 14 15 of black maternal mortality and morbidity is a sad 16 result of years of systemic racism, discrimination, and bias in the healthcare industry that has 17 18 contributed to the mistreatment and mishandling of black birthing individuals and it's unacceptable. 19 Black women and all women deserve access to quality 20 patient-centered reproductive health care that is 21 2.2 culturally sensitive and attuned to their unique needs. Intro 2042 on today's agenda is the first 23 major step to ensuring that all birthing individuals 24 have access to midwife information and removes all the 25

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2 barriers that could prevent potential maternal complications. There's a lot of work that needs to be 3 done moving forward, but I'm grateful for today's 4 bill. And I want to thank Speaker Johnson, Health 5 Committee Chair Mark Levine, Women's Caucus 6 [inaudible] members, my cochair, Farah Louis, and I 7 also want to speak in support of Intro 146 and give a 8 huge shout-out to Chair Steve Levin and all the 9 housing advocates. We're finally going to raise the 10 value of the city FEPS voucher to provide so many 11 12 homelessness New Yorkers with access to truly affordable housing. When you look at the faces of 13 14 homeless New Yorkers they are working class people 15 that have full-time jobs that cannot afford the rents 16 in our city. This is going to be a major step forward, transformative in nature, and I'm really 17 18 grateful that we're voting on this. 4 COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: OK, sorry. Reclaiming my time. We recently commemorated the 5 6 death of George Floyd, a black man killed without cause by an officer of the law and that horrendous 7 criminal act is sadly a part of the history of this 8 country that manifests a litany of crimes embedded and 9 10 protected in the systems that perpetuate innumerable political, economic, and social injustices against 11 black people. I want to call attention to the race 12 massacre which occurred a hundred years ago on May 31, 13 1921, against a black community of Greenwood in Tulsa, 14 Oklahoma, perpetuated by, perpetrated by law officers 15 16 and those that they deputized. Greenwood was founded in 1960 by O. W. Gurley who purchased property in so-17 called Indian territory. There were many African 18 Americans who had traveled with the Native Americans 19 during that Trail of Tears to that territory. 20 The community of Greenwood became an epicenter for black 21 2.2 families and entrepreneurs and professionals and laborers as well. The businesses included hotels, 23 banks, hospitals, churches, newspapers, school system, 24 transportation systems, restaurants, jewelry stores, 25

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2 theaters, and clothing stores. It is said the dollar exchanged 19 times in Greenwood before it left the 3 community. This, ah, thriving, self-sufficient, self-4 reliant [inaudible] black Wall Street community drew 5 6 the envy, the jealousy, the animosity, and ire of the white community that literally was on the other side 7 of the railroad tracks. Following the resurgence of 8 the KKK, the continuing rise of Jim Crow, and the 9 horrible incidents of the Red Summer of 1919 and the 10 spread of lynching, law enforcement attacked Tulsa, 11 burned it to the ground, dropped firebombs from 12 airplanes, and leveled that community known as Black 13 Wall Street. 14

15 SERGEANT AT ARMS: Time expired. 16 COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Thank you. It is said that the damages included 30, what would be 35 17 18 million dollars in today's property value. Six thousand people were [inaudible] in Tulsa, 10,000 19 homeless, and 300 were killed. So I want to call 20 attention to the 100th anniversary of the Tulsa race 21 2.2 massacre May 31, 1921, and say that they have still not received adequate compensation and reparation. 23 Thank you. 24

2 MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you. We 3 will now have Council Member Menchaca.

SERGEANT AT ARMS: Time starts now.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER MENCHACA: Thank you, 6 Majority Leader. I want to make brief remarks about 7 two resolutions I'm introducing today, one with Public Advocate Jumaane Williams and the other with Council 8 Member Alicka Ampry-Samuel. The New York For All Act, 9 when President Trump was elected in 2016 I drew 10 strength from the fact that we had already built a 11 12 sanctuary system that disentangled local law enforcement from immigration enforcement. His 13 14 presidency was a stress test for that system and for 15 the most part it protected immigrant New Yorkers from 16 his worst policies. But our sanctuary system only applies to New York City. There are thousands of New 17 18 Yorkers in the rest of the state who continue to be subject to the worst excess of our deportation 19 20 machine. This is why Public Advocate Jumaane Williams and I are introducing a resolution calling on the 21 2.2 state to pass the New York For All Act. The bill would take the New York City sanctuary system and 23 apply it statewide, while strengthening it in the 24

2 legislature session, which is why I'm grateful that the speaker is moving our resolution forward today and 3 helping us secure something hopefully in the next few 4 weeks while we go up and fight in Albany. Next, the 5 second resolution I'm introducing today with Council 6 Member Alicka Ampry-Samuel, which also involves some 7 of our most vulnerable neighbors. As we all know, for 8 years now NYCHA has been plagued by gas stoppages, 9 10 electrical outages, and lead in drinking water. Too often, those of us who are fortunate, ah, too often 11 12 those of us fortunate enough to represent NYCHA residents make a big deal about some of the failures. 13 14 Then we celebrate a very long-delayed, ah, return of 15 the service, but what is happening here is that NYCHA 16 residents are still paying full 100% rent. What we are asking in this bill in the state is for people in 17 18 our communities, NYCHA residents, to get compensation, to get abatement. This is why I'm proud to represent 19 20 this, ah, ah, and introduce this resolution with Ampry-Samuel to call on the state to pass... 21 Time expired. 2.2 SERGEANT AT ARMS: 23 COUNCIL MEMBER MENCHACA: ...[inaudible] Utility Accountability Act. Um, we'll be in touch 24 25 with you throughout the next few weeks so we can bring 2 those voices to the state legislative body and pass 3 this in this session in the next few weeks. Thank you 4 so much, Speaker Johnson, and everyone who's worked on 5 this.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you.7 Council Member Koo.

8 SERGEANT AT ARMS: Time starts now. COUNCIL MEMBER KOO: Thank you, Majority 9 10 Leader. Today I am asking my colleagues to join me in signing onto a resolution by myself and Council Member 11 Chin and Treyger, calling upon the New York State 12 Legislature to pass and the governor to sign 13 legislation that will require public schools to teach 14 15 Asian American history and civic impact. This 16 resolution supports state legislation that has recently introduced by Senator John Liu and Assembly 17 18 Member Ron Kim. And it follows a year that has seen 150% increase in Asian hate crimes across the United 19 States, according to recent studies. It also follows 20 a recent survey that found 40% of Americans were 21 2.2 unable to identify, to identify even one prominent Asian American. In that survey the most common answer 23 was I don't know. The second most common answer was 24 25 Jackie Chan, who is not even American. Clearly we

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2 have a lot of work to do. The best way to combat hatred and hate crimes is through education and the 3 best place to get an education is in our classrooms. 4 This is where our young people form their ideas and 5 6 social skills. It is where they establish identities, which in turn helps to teach children to appreciate 7 one another and to reduce implicit bias. In so many 8 ways American history is world history. Most New 9 10 Yorker know this, but too many do not. From the rise in anti-Asian hate crimes it must be our 11 responsibility to ensure future generations have every 12 opportunity to learn about the history, the 13 14 contributions, and the civic impact of all of us, not 15 just some of us. So I hope you will join us in 16 supporting this resolution that will require Asian American history and civic impact in our public 17 18 schools. Thank you, Majority Leader. MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: 19 Thank you, 20 Council Member Koo. Mr. Parliamentarian, if there are no other members that wish to speak I'll close. 21 2.2 PARLIAMENTARIAN: There are. Um, Council Member Chin would also like to speak, and then you may 23 close. 24

And I've heard all my colleague asking me 9 10 when are we gonna open our senior center, and a lot of the, our constituency, our seniors, have been asking 11 12 this. And the administration still have not put a plan together. They said that they started grab-and-13 14 go and it hasn't happened. Um, and so we demand that 15 they should definitely have a plan in place. 16 Restaurants are open, venues are open, Broadway is gonna be open. When are we gonna open our senior 17 18 center? So I urge my colleague to sign on, um, to this introduction so that we can get our center open 19 20 as quickly as possible. Ah, the other thing is my resolution, um, calling on the New York State Assembly 21 2.2 to pass and the governor to sign S14 and A613, the 23 Jose Webster's Untraceable Firearm Act. I think people have heard about ghost guns and those things 24

are not regulated, um, in our state and with so much

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2 gun violence happening in our city we need to stop 3 that. And I, so I urge my colleague to also sign on 4 to support this resolution. Thank you. Thank you, 5 Majority Leader.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you,
Council Member Chin. And I just wanted to close
addressing so much of the hate that we are seeing all
across this city. Um, when Reverend Dr. Martin

afternoon we, we, we are introducing legislation, and,

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2 and, and let me just say happy Memorial Day to all and thank you for those who have protected, ah, during 3 time of war, in time of peace, and let us also 4 remember those, ah, who we've lost during the time of 5 6 COVID, who we have not had the opportunity to memorialize. Ah, let's keep them in mind. Today we 7 will be introducing two pieces of legislation. 8 The first introduction, 2325, at the request of the mayor, 9 would amend the administrative code of New York City 10 in relationship to protection of restaurant, food, 11 food service, and airport workers displaced due to 12 COVID-19. This legislation would require covered 13 employees to be rehired, laid-off employees due to 14 government order, lack of business, reduction in, in 15 16 the working force and/or other economic reasons before hiring new employees. It would give certain workers 17 18 who have been laid off through, through no fault of their own, the opportunity to get back to, to their, 19 This is ensuring that New Yorkers are 20 ah, positions. affordable, afforded most, ah, their most experienced 21 2.2 workforce. [inaudible] please support, ah, Intro 2325. And then next, ah, I along with some of my 23 colleagues will, ah, who have signed on, I want to 24 thank you, we'll be introducing Intro 2326 related to

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2 rank choice voting. Out of deep concern for the June 22 primary, ah, and how it may play out, the software 3 to count rank choice voting ballots was only approved 4 on May 25, with the state noting ongoing security 5 concerns and their RSCV proponents admitting that the 6 lack of cast votes record, records being related in a 7 timely fashion could frustrate public trust and 8 accountability. Both Dominion and the city's in-home 9 election vendor declined to bid... 10

SERGEANT AT ARMS: Time.

12 COUNCIL MEMBER MILLER: ... on the city's RFP, citing serious concerns about timeless and 13 14 significant risk to ensuring successful elections. Based solely on what we have seen thus far, it is 15 16 apparent that New York City deserves the opportunity to make an informed decision about rank choice voting. 17 18 This proposed legislation would allow a much wider swath of voters to determine whether or not rank 19 20 choice voting is right for New York City and we'll be able to use the June 22 primary as the benchmark for 21 2.2 making their decision. I want to the Majority Leader and the colleagues that have signed on to this 23 legislation. Should we find that New York City is not 24 ready for rank choice voting, ah, by virtue of the 25

2 June 22 primary this introduction, this legislation will be prepared and will allow us, ah, New Yorkers to 3 have, to give informed choice, ah, ah, and decisions 4 come November, ah, general election. I want to thank 5 6 you, Madam Majority Leader, for your time. 7 MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you so much, Council Member Miller. And thank you so much 8 for your leadership. 9 10 PARLIAMENTARIAN: Madam Majority Leader, we now recognize Council Member Yeger. 11 12 MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Council Member Yeger, you may begin. 13 14 SERGEANT AT ARMS: Time starts now. 15 COUNCIL MEMBER YEGER: Thank you, Madam 16 President. Ah, and I recognize that I'm, I'm signing on late, ah, signing up late. And all this would do, 3 all this would do, is put it in front of the voters, 4 for them to make a choice, an intelligent choice, not 5 6 in a low-turnout election, and, and a flag which I raised in 2018 on the Government Affairs Committee, 7 um, ah, Government Operations Committee, when, ah, the 8 public advocate and the Manhattan borough president 9 were testifying and I specifically asked why would we 10 want to put this on the ballot in 2019 when nobody is 11 going to vote. And the statistic is that 73% of those 12 who bother to show up to vote voted in favor. 13 Well, 14 first of all, not my district. We opposed it and it was beaten in my district. But secondly, the totality 15 of the number of people who voted in favor of this 16 represents a pittance of registered enrolled voters in 17 18 New York City. Let's put this on the ballot in a 19 mayoral election year. I would have preferred doing 20 it in a presidential election year. Let the greater part of New York City participate. But with the full, 21 2.2 ah, set of information and facts after all the ballots are counted this year in the primary, let's ask the 23 electorate in November to decide whether this is what 24 they want their future to be, and that's why I'm proud 25

And truer words could not have been 19 20 spoken. Hate works in much of the same way as injustice. There is no doubt that hate crimes have 21 2.2 been on the rise across this country during and since the presidency of Donald Trump against black, Latinos, 23 Asians, Muslims, Jews, women, and the LGBTQ community. 24 We saw during the capital riots a conversion of hatred 25

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2 onto our nation with nooses being hung, Camp Auschwitz paraphernalia, and a consistent message of the Chinese 3 virus, which made our Asian community that much more 4 vulnerable. Living in a city as diverse as New York 5 6 City requires everyone to speak out against hatred in any form, when it is against your community, but 7 especially when it is against a community that you 8 don't necessarily identify with or shame, share the 9 same values or beliefs with. Elected officials can 10 continue to issue quotes or statements condemning hate 11 and violence, but until we realize that hate and 12 violence are like a virus that does not remain 13 14 isolated against any one group of people we will never make progress. At baseline we all have to agree that 15 16 in order to live in a diverse community we have to have a shared responsibility to collectively work and 17 18 condemn hate, even when your silence benefits us in the short term. So I will close with that, and I will 19 20 turn it over to Speaker Corey Johnson to close today's meeting of May 27, 2021. 21
