SERGEANT AT ARMS BRADLEY: Yes, good afternoon, and welcome to today's New York City Council vote on Transportation. At this time will all members please turn on your videos for verification purpose. Thank you, Chair. We may begin.

CHAIRPERSON RODRIGUEZ: Thank you, sergeants, and the whole team of the tech, eh, department of the, of the City Council, eh, for always being there supporting us on this hearing and many other hearings, that is part of our responsibility. Eh, good afternoon and welcome to the Committee on Transportation's hearing to vote on proposed Intro number 176-A, sponsored by Council Member Maisel. I am Ydanis Rodriguez, the chair of this committee. Proposed Intro 176-A will create an interagency task force for removing certain vehicles from public streets. As we all know, curb space in New York City is in high demand, especially in

2	certain residential and commercial areas. Every year
3	residents company of vehicles being parked without
4	license plate for long periods of time. Some auto
5	body repair shops remove license plates from motor
6	vehicles and then park them, they park these vehicles
7	in the street or abandon them. Under New York State
8	law a motor vehicle must have a valid license plate
9	and valid registration to operate or be parked on the
10	streets. And in vehicles license plates must match
11	its registration number. Without proportion
12	registration or license plate it is difficult for the
13	NYPD to identify and ticket owners for these
14	vehicles. Proposed Intro 176-A will create an
15	interagency task force to study the city's existing
16	system by removing from public streets vehicles that
17	have been abandoned or parked without license plate
18	or proper registration. The task force will include
19	the Commissioner of Transportation, Commissioner of
20	Sanitation, and the police commissioner or their
21	respective designate. And two additional members
22	appointed by the mayor, the task force will examine
23	the city's current procedures and develop
24	recommendations to improve and assist in removal
25	practices, all of which would submit, would be

submitted in a final report to the mayor and the
speaker and the council. I will now call on Council

Member Maisel that sponsored this legislation to give

5 his opening statement.

COUNCIL MEMBER MAISEL: Ah, thank you, ah, Chair Rodriguez, for the opportunity for this bill to be heard in committee. Um, actually, ah, you got to most of the salient points. There's really not much left that I could say about the legislation, except to say that for as long as I've been around, ah, in government, ah, these cars and trucks that are on the city streets have been a plaque in my district and in the districts of many of my colleagues. private individuals and companies are using the city streets as storage facilities. As real estate, ah, in the city has gotten to be very expensive, ah, many of the lots that we use for storage have been, um, um, used for housing, and now people are just parking on the streets, and it is creating enormous problems. Um, one of the small problems is since these trucks don't move it's hard to clean the streets, so it creates a, a sanitation problem, and, of course, as the Chairman said, parking is at a premium. Some of these cars and trucks are there for, for years.

5	force, which is what the legislation calls for, and
5	I'm very pleased that it's being heard today. Thank
