DIRECTOR OF SECURITY: Good morning and well to today's remote New York City Council hearing of the Committee on Governmental Operations. At this time, would all panelists please turn on their video for verification purposes and please place all electronic devices to vibrate or silent mode. Thank you for your cooperation. Chair Cabrera, we are ready to begin.

CHAIR CABRERA: Thank you so much. Good afternoon. I am Council Member Fernando Cabrera, Chair on the Committee on Governmental Operations. I want to start off by thanking the members of the Committee joining us today. Today, the Committee will be joining, will be voting on two pieces of legislation; Introduction number 2257, sponsored by myself, will require the Board of Standards and Appeals upon issuing a decision affecting the use of a partial lane to have a copy of that decision recorded in the county in which the property is located. This will ensure that BSA decisions affecting property in Manhattan, Brooklyn, Queen, and

COMMITTEE ON GOVERNMENTAL OPERATIONS the Bronx will be available in the automatic city register information system. Decision affecting properties (inaudible) will be available in the electronic recording system maintained by the Richmond County Clerk. The Committee previously heard this legislation on Tuesday, June 8th. The BSA needs this legislated noted to improve its transparency and I urge my colleague to vote I on the Bill. The second Bill the Committee will vote on is proposed Introduction number 2313A sponsored by Council Member Ydanis Rodriquez which will create an Office of Ethnic and Community Media and place certain requirements on agency advertising spending. The Committee previously heard this legislation on Tuesday June 8th when we heard from representatives of ethic and community media outlets, we are so grateful for the work these trusted messengers do tirelessly communicating critical and relevant information to New Yorkers from all walks of life. In the last several years, multi-lingual campaigns conducted by the city have become the norm. We saw this with the initial I.D. NYC rollout and mostly with the city's census campaign and COVID-19 rapid

response in 2020. Since the Mayor directed the

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COMMITTEE ON GOVERNMENTAL OPERATIONS agencies to spend at least half of the advertising budgets on ethnic and community media outlets, the executive order 47 of 2019, the city has substantially increased the advertising spending in this type of outlet. In physical year 2020, the city spent 9.9 million dollars or 84 percent of its total advertising dollar in community outlets, a dramatic improvement from only 18 percent span of community media advertising in 2013. The mayor's executive order 47 is widely seen as a resounding success and I am pleased that we are voting to codify this secular order by voting on proposed Introduction 2313A. urge my colleagues to vote in favor of this legislation and guarantee the city's continued commitment to ethnic and community media outlets. Council Member Rodriguez has been an advocate for immigrants and limited English proficiency communities in his District and across the city. recommend this legislation. Thank you to Council Member Rodriguez for this legislation. I also want to thank our dream team, committee staff, CJ Mary (SP?), Emily Forgone (SP?), Elizabeth Cron (SP?), Sebastian Vachi (SP?), and I want to thank my Legislative Director, Claude Pena (SP?) for making

Council Member Rodriguez. 11 12 CM RODRIGUEZ: Yeah, should I speak now? 13 LEGISLATIVE CLERK: Yes, sir. 14 CM RODRIGUEZ: Thank you. I would like 15 to start by first thanking the Speaker Corey Johnson; 16 Brooklyn Borough President, Eric Adam; Council Member 17 Oswaldo Feliz; and Chair Fernando Cabrera for their 18 support on Intro 2313 which will establish the 19 Mayor's Office of Ethnic and Community Media. I'd 20 also like to thank my whole staff, you know, Jeff (SP?), Jason Goldman (SP?), Chief of Staff Speaker 21 22 and everyone that worked on this legislation, so 23 also, my chief of staff, (inaudible) and Evelyn 24 Collado (SP?) my communication person and Margarita.

During the heights of the pandemic, they were many

COMMITTEE ON GOVERNMENTAL OPERATIONS communities who were left in dark because the city fails to properly advertise and communicate the safety measures put in place by city and state and barrier language and working with the local community. Now this is not something new. For many years, our communities have been so dirty when it comes to those places in underserved communities; however, how are, in the city are educating, you know the resident, how is the city connecting the resident to live in, especially in the poorest neighborhood about the information and resources that we have, have not been something a priority to connect with the local and community media. There are over 200 languages spoken across the city and hundreds of ethnic and community media outlets. We must work with all media to ensure we're spreading important information in all languages to all New Yorkers, not only to those who speak English, and one of those New Yorkers, 35 percent born and raised in another country whose English is not the first language; however, people like me contribute a lot with our taxes and contributing in different ways, shape and form to the development of this city. This Bill is a huge win for our local media. It will require all

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1 COMMITTEE ON GOVERNMENTAL OPERATIONS 2 agencies to devote 50 percent of their advertising spending including print, digital publication, 3 television, and radio outlets to ethnic and community 4 5 media. I thank my colleagues again, Chairman 6 Cabrera, and again, Speaker Corey Johnson for all 7 their support and especially thank you also to Brooklyn Borough President, Eric Adams with whom I 8 was, I started this Bill from the beginning. 9 10 going to be a big day for all New Yorkers, especially those who have been providing their services in 11 media, radio, TV, digital, printed, and the city has 12 never invested any dollars to them, and so with that, 13 14 I definitely support this Bill, and I should I vote I 15 now? 16 LEGISLATIVE CLERK: Yes, sir. 17 CM RODRIGUEZ: And with that, I vote I. 18 LEGISLATIVE CLERK: Thank you. Final 19 vote, proposed Introduction 2313A is adopted by the 20 Committee with eight in the affirmative, one in the negative, and no abstentions, and Introduction 2257 21

is adopted by the Committee with nine in the

abstentions. Mr. Chair, that is a full Committee.
