I'm Council Member Mark Gjonaj, Chair on the

Committee on Small Business and I would like to

welcome you to our remote hearing today on proposed

introductions 2233A and 2234A. This past Tuesday,

Governor Cuomo announced that New York State will

fully open, lifting all capacity requirements for

businesses in New York City. These requirements and

the shutting down of New York City were necessary

steps to keep New Yorkers safe and to stop the spread

of COVID-19. Nonetheless, small businesses have

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stuck with doing the past 14 months. As the city's small businesses were forced to fight to survive and depleted revenues, small business revenues were down over 70% in March of 2020 in comparison to January 2020, and over 3,000 small businesses closed permanent between the start of the pandemic and July 27th, of 2020. As this city looks to exit from the dark days of the pandemic, we'll begin to enter a period of recovery. The return of New York City as the financial and cultural capital of the world is only possible, however, if we have vibrant commercial corridors filled with small businesses such as barber shops, bodegas, local pizzerias and torterias. city must, therefore, build back better as we must me make and work hard to make New York City a friendlier environment for small business to operate. committee has done that hard work as we have reviewed hundreds of laws and regulations which small business must comply in asserted areas where we can reform unnecessary burdensome requirements and prohibitions. I'm proud to a co-sponsor of Council Member Gibson's Bill, proposed Introduction 2233A which would create lasting civil relief penalties for small businesses relating to certain sanitation, health,

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transportation, consumer affairs, noise control, and building violations. The Bill will lower certain existing fines to help keep more money in the small business owner's pockets. It will also create cure periods or eliminate civil penalties all together for certain first violations. This Bill will also clarify that submission of proof of cure for consumer affairs and health violation is an admission of liability only if the proof is accepted by the relevant agency and a repeal number of requirements and prohibitions in the administrative code to provide relief for the small business. I am also proud to be voting on my own Bill today, proposed Introduction 2234A. This Bill will require the Commissioner of Finance to establish a temporary program to resolve outstanding judgements issued by ECB, Environmental Control Board, subject to certain conditions. The fault penalties and associative accrued interest will be weighed, respondents will be able to resolve judgements docketed prior to March 7th, 2020 by payment of 70 percent of the imposed penalties without payment of accrued interest, and respondents will be able to resolve judgements docketed on or after March 7th, 2020 by payment of 25

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to really find those provisions that did not impede on anyone's public health, nor public safety, so I want to be very clear that this Bills do not jeopardize anyone's health or wellness or safety, not customers, not employees, and certainly not the small businesses, but when you look at the some of the infractions like improper signage, businesses should not be subjected to hundreds of dollars in fines for these types of infractions. We have to do more to educate our businesses to provide outreach with language diversity and cultural understanding to make sure that we're working with them and not against them, and so I'm of this Bill, Intro 2233, is a step in the right direction, the staff has worked so hard on this and I want thank my team and as all of my colleagues on the Small Business Committee to please support, and I want to thank you, Chair Mark Gjonaj for your leadership during this time, particularly on behalf of not just all businesses in the city of New York, but in particular Bronx small business who have been exacerbated by COVID-19 and not given access to a lot of the grants and loan opportunities that others have seen. We have to do better by all of our businesses, but certainly those in our bellowed
