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SGT. AT ARMS: This is a sound check for the Committee on Civil and Human Rights being recorded by Israel Martinez, July 29th, 2021, taking place in City Council Chambers.

CHAIR EUGENE: Good morning. I'm Council Member Mathieu Eugene and I'm the Chair of the Civil and Humans Rights Committee. Today, the committee will be voting on Introduction number 339B, sponsored by Council Member Debbie Rose which expands protection under the City Human Rights Law to domestic workers. There are an estimated 2.5 million domestic workers in the United Stated which is one of the nation's fastest growing professions as domestic worker is often intermittent, isolated and perform for very small enterprise such as an individual family. Domestic workers are uniquely vulnerable to abuse including sexual harassment, assault, and various forms of this combination. Domestic workers also belong to a vulnerable population in the workforce as 95 percent of domestic workers are women and 54 percent identify as non-right. In a recent survey of domestic workers, over 80 percent reported that they have worked in an abusive situation.

Despite rampant violations, they are limited legal

COMMITTEE ON CIVIL AND HUMAN RIGHTS resources and law for domestic workers. In 2010, the New York State Human Rights Law was amended to protect domestic workers from sexual and discriminatory arrangement, but domestic workers did not receive the full promised protection of the City Human Rights Law. Similarly, New York City's Human Rights Law only applied to entrepreneurs with four or more employees. Therefore, domestic workers were often employed in private home by those who have few employees, are left vulnerable without many of the city's human rights protection. In 2018, the City Council passes a law 1998 which removed the fouremployee requirement for gender-based arrangement Today, we'll be voting on Intro 339B which would amend the New York City Human Rights Law to extend employee protections to domestic workers regardless of the number of staff employed. Before we begin, I would like to congratulate the members of the committee with use today. Today, we have Council Member Barron, thank you very much, Council Member; Council Member Dromm, thank you very much; Council Member Lander, thank you; Council Member Perkins, thank you very much; and we have with us also the sponsor of this wonderful legislation, Council Member

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Rose and also Council Member Koslowitz. Thank you so very much, and now, I would like to invite Council Member Rose to deliver a statement.

CM ROSE: Thank you so much, Chair Today, we will vote to pass Intro 339 which will grant protections for our domestic workers under the Human Rights Law. New York City's Human Rights Law is one of the most expansive human rights laws in the country and is intended to be more liberally construed than similar states and federal laws. Law provides protections to employees and prospective employees from discrimination in the workplace. 2011, it was brought to my attention, however, that the law is not, in fact, being construed literally, and that there are people who are not afforded protections from discrimination. Intro 339 would otherwise apply the entirety of the human rights law to domestic workers including discrimination in hiring, firing, promotions, and all employment decisions based on all protected categories; race, gender, disability, and obligations related to pregnancy and other medical accommodations as well as sexual harassment which would include training for the employer and the obligation to disclose rights of

COMMITTEE ON CIVIL AND HUMAN RIGHTS the employee upon hiring. I'm really proud to be here today on behalf of all of the domestic workers who have been in unprotected status for far too long. So, domestic workers and healthcare workers across the state are moments away from being protected as all other employees currently are. I want to thank Speaker Corey Johnson for his leadership, his steadfast dedication to the people of our city, and his support of this Bill. I also want to thank Jason Goldman who is Chief of Staff. I'd like to thank Isa Cortez (SP?), my Legislative and Budget Director who has fervently worked over the years to get this Bill passed, and I want to thank Alina Francis Martin (SP?), my previous Legislative and Budget Director who recognized that the Human Right Law excluded protections for so many workers back in 2011. I want to thank Jay Shree Gonapathy (SP?) whose the Counsel to the Civil and Human Rights Committee, Rachel Cordero (SP?), and Larissa Santino (SP?) who is the Co-Director of the National Domestic Workers Alliance, as well as everybody else who is a part of the Domestic Workers Alliance, my colleagues and all of the domestic workers and health care workers across the state. Chair Eugene, I thank you so much

3 know that domestic workers are also very thankful and

I vote I.
