COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Today's Land Use Call-Ups are adopted by a vote of 48 in the affirmative, with zero in the negative. Communications from the Speaker.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much, Mr. Majority Leader. The next vote we cast will be for the adoption of the Fiscal Year 2011 budget. And I think as all of us who have been part of this budget process know, this was one of the more difficult adoption processes we have had in a number of years. It was a difficult budget for a number of reasons. One, the budget of the State of New York is still very unknown, and what portion of the over \$11 billion we believe they are going to give us--they owe us a lot more, but that we've budgeted for--what part of that we're going to get, we don't actually know. Will the federal Medicaid money that is owed the City of New York arrive this year and next year? We don't

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But what we do know is that this City, know. State and country are in the midst of one of the worst recessions we have ever seen. And what we knew is that we had an obligation to New Yorkers to pass an on time budget, a budget that was balanced, a budget that did not ask them to dig any deeper into their wallets or pocketbooks to fund our government, and a budget which did not expand borrowing, and therefore add the bill to our grandchildren and great grandchildren. accomplished all of those goals. But we also wanted to make sure that the numbers in this budget book were seen as more than just numbers on a page, that we looked at those numbers and saw the faces of the children they represented, the faces of people with AIDS, the faces of seniors, the faces of people who are protected and saved every day by the New York City Fire Department and the New York City Police Department.

And we wanted to go in to the budget sent to us by Mayor Bloomberg and his staff and add in funds that would make sure that the core functions of city government—to protect New Yorkers, to preserve services to the most

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That's why we went back into the Administration
for Children's Services and added over \$30
million, to make sure that the 202 social workers

vulnerable and most needed -- were in that budget.

7 Brown were not attritted out of the Administration

and caseworkers who were hired after Nixzmary

8 of Children's Services. That is what we owe those

9 children. That is why when there was a proposal

10 to cut staff in the HIV/AIDS Service

11 Administration, we added \$5 million back into HASA

12 to make sure New Yorkers in need got the support

we needed.

Now that list of areas, I could go on a little bit longer, but I think you get the point. We had two important jobs, to pass a budget that was fiscally responsible because the good times are not, sadly, around the corner. But we also had a responsibility to pass a budget that recognized that that lack of good times hit some people harder than others. There was no way we could protect every service. There was no way we could restore every cut and still plan for the future. We struck a balance in this budget that meets all of the goals that I've articulated, a

budget where we should be proud of ourselves and look our constituents in the eye and say, we did the best job we could do balancing our fiscal responsibility with the needs of New Yorkers.

So I want to thank everyone who has worked long and hard on the FY '11 budget. I want to start by singling out our new Finance Chair, Domenic M. Recchia, Jr.

SPEAKER QUINN: Domenic, from the way he conducted the budget hearings to the late, late hours he spent here, to the food he brought all of us from Brooklyn, to the attention to detail of the things he cared about, the things I cared about and the things his colleagues mentioned and asked him to watch out for, has raised the bar about what it means to be a Finance Chair in the New York City Council. Domenic, you have made me prouder than I thought you would. I knew you would do a good job, but you have exceeded even my expectations, so thank you so very, very much, Domenic for that great work.

I want to thank the members of my leadership team and the budget negotiating team

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who took on--the leadership team, who every day take on extra responsibilities, and the budget negotiating team who take on extra responsibilities throughout the year, for all of your hard work. I want to thank the people in the Speaker's Office, first and foremost our First Deputy Chief of Staff Ramon Martinez, who was simultaneously working on this and a major Land Use proposal. And if you didn't notice, this is the new, improved, Zen Ramon. I think it felt different for everybody than it did in years past. The new members, you may not have appreciated it, but it is the new and improved Ramon. I want to thank my Chief of Staff Chuck Meara, for all his work.

everyone in the Speaker's Office, all the
Seargents-At-Arms, all the assistants and
secretaries for taking care of us throughout this
process. I didn't, when I was mentioning Domenic,
but I meant to. I want to single out a member of
his staff, who really became an adjunct member of
the Speaker's Staff and the Finance Staff, Karen

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Becker, really, I mean, just unbelievable. Thank you very, very much. She still will only call me Madam Speaker, no matter how many times I ask her to call me Chris. But thank you very much, Karen.

I think we all know the next thing I'm going to say, but it bears repeating a million times over. We are blessed with an amazing staff in our Finance Division, with a group of people who work incredibly hard, make far less money than they would if they worked for the Administration or somewhere on Wall Street or for some other financial entity, people who are here every day, sometimes days on end without sleep, because they care about the city they call home, because they care about the schools their children go to, because they care about the services they received growing up in this city, because they want to keep their neighborhoods the places that they love. I wish I could mention each of you, because you each in different ways have really done an amazing job. As I said to some of you on Friday, you scare me with your knowledge. I had to leave one meeting because a particular member of the staff had so much knowledge I was just afraid. It was too much

information. But I really want to thank all of you. And I know at times we lurk around—me in particular—wanting info more quickly, wanting things faster. You guys are really just the best, and we are so incredibly, incredibly lucky to have you. And if I could ask all of the Finance staff to please stand up for a minute.

SPEAKER QUINN: And I just want to just add on the Finance Staff. I know the thing that's—one thing I just want to add that's remarkable to me is, I feel like every member of the Finance Staff knows the things that are my priorities and watches out for them in a particular, particular way. But the truth is, you do that for all 51 members, and that is really, really remarkable.

Lastly, but certainly not least, I want to single out the two men who are charged with leading our finance division, our First Deputy Director of Finance Jeff Rodus.

Director, who when he accepted the job I asked if

SPEAKER QUINN: And really, in any job one could have, but nonetheless charged with the unbelievable responsibility of working towards the adoption of the budget of the City of New York, you couldn't have two better people at your side. If you were in a foxhole, you would want Preston Niblack and Jeff Rodus with you, because they would be there 'til the end. They would stick with you. There are no two harder working, more loyal, more competent people anywhere in City Government, or probably any company or organization in the City of New York than Preston and Jeff. Literally Preston, on Friday night or Saturday night, sent me an email outlining what I should be thinking about for 2012. That's the kind of dedication or sickness we have on our staff. So, thank you both more than I can ever

2 say.

Lastly, let me thank the Mayor's

Office. Mark Page, everyone at the Office of

Management and Budget, everyone in the Mayor's

Office of Legislative Affairs, for working with us

on this budget. And I urge all of my colleagues

to vote yes on this budget, and that concludes

colleagues, I rise today because while you're

clapping and celebrating, some New Yorkers are

going to be crying. This budget was not a budget

of necessity; this was a budget of choice. We

chose to cut \$2.7 million from the Vallone

Scholarships. Some students are going to be

crying. We chose to say libraries can't open for

six days; they have to open now for five days. We

chose to say to the Legal Services, go try to get

an RFP going instead of giving them enough money

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for a year to last and provide the services. chose to only have 31,000 jobs for our youth--140,000 young people applying for 31,000 jobs. We used to have 55,000 jobs. We chose that. chose to close some daycare centers, still, and restore others. We chose to close some senior centers, still, and restore others. We chose to sit here and cut \$200 million worth of programs, some programs are zeroed out. And we're celebrating. Some New Yorkers are going to be fired; they're going to lose their jobs. While we celebrate and clap, some are going to be crying. And I say we chose it, because if this was necessary to do, I'd vote for it myself. But when you have \$3.3 billion in the rainy day fund called the Healthcare Retirement Fund, use about \$900 million of it, and you choose not to take a simple \$200 million out, leave the other \$2 billion for the rainy day, and spend the \$200 million for the rain today--that's a choice you made that wasn't necessary. This pain didn't have to be the pain that the people of New York will be suffering as you celebrate your budget balancing. It didn't have to happen. We had options. The State is

And you know, every day I constantly refocus about the needs of our great city, and the community that I represent in Northern Manhattan. Am I totally satisfied with this budget? No. I know it's a budget that has been agreed to by the executive branch and the legislative branch, and we've reached a consensus. Could we possibly have done more? Yes. Could we have done worse than we have done? Absolutely, yes. And In fact I was on radio this morning at WWRL and the conclusion that was asked, that Mayor Bloomberg said, that is this going to be painful--yes. it's going to be devastating--my answer was no. And could I agree with that assessment? My answer Because, quite frankly, knowing what I was ves. know as a member of this body for the past nine years, as a member of the finance committee for the past nine years, as a member of the Budget Negotiating Team for the past five years, as Co-Chair of the Black, Latino and Asian Caucus for several years, I say to you that this budget is

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better than I had expected it to be. And I do
know my colleagues, based on the State and the
federal government, especially with G20 meeting,
and they're supposed to cut the deficit in half in
several years, that we have tough roads ahead.
And we have to be able to make sure that we focus
now in order to ensure for the future. And so
with that, I want to congratulate everyone
involved in putting this budget together the way
it is today, and I'm obviously going to vote yes.
Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you very much. Council Member and Finance Chairman Domenic Recchia.

very much. I'll just make a statement to my colleagues. And I've let you know that this has not been an easy process. Between the economic downturn and the loss of funding from the State and federal governments and the difficulty of balancing the needs of the biggest city in the world, it was time for us to take a hard look at the budget. It's time for us to move past that. This was a difficult process, but it also

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represents what's great about New York City--our ability to work together in a time of crisis and to move forward no matter what obstacles are in our path. The most important thing is that we came together and we passed a balanced budget on time, that preserves the core services--and one that doesn't raise taxes.

By working with the Mayor, the City Council was able to prevent the closure of 20 fire companies, maintain citywide library services at an average of five days a week. We were able to maintain the current level of staffing for our child welfare workers at ACS. And the Council demonstrated its commitment to our cultural institutions by avoiding devastating cuts to museums, zoos, botanical gardens and protecting the City's cultural economy. We even restored funding for public pools as a sign to New Yorkers that we understand the needs, but we also understand what a cold pool on a hot summer day can mean to a neighborhood.

Most importantly, we are laying the foundation that will ensure our long-term financial health by making decisions that aren't

2	just focused on this year's budget, but the years
3	beyond this. And to address Council Member
4	Charles Barron, I have to say, Council Member
5	Barron, we acted responsible and in a way that we
6	are going to help the futurebecause next year's
7	budget is going to be harder for us and the
8	decisions are just going to get tougher; and
9	that's what we did by putting money in the
10	Healthcare Trust Fund. Because we are looking to
11	the future of this city and the future of our
12	children.

When we talk about cuts, I'd like to remind everyone that these tough cuts that we have to make are all the fault of Albany. We don't ask for aid from Albany. We ask for our own money back from Albany. If we had it, we wouldn't have to make any of these cuts—although as Jimmy Oddo will tell you, there are still some responsible ones that need to be made.

I am concerned about some of these cuts, and the only thing I agree with Charles Barron on is the cuts to the CUNY, the New York City Council CUNY Scholarship. Funding is down one-third for those poor kids who worked so hard to achieve those scholarships based on merit. And that was the Mayor's choice. We restored our funding; the Mayor did not restore his funding, and I think that is very unfortunate. I'm going to have to disclose that I provided a list of my father's clients to the Conflict of Interest Board and to our Council. And I assume some of those are receiving funds or he would a pretty lousy

2	consultant. So, I'm going to also vote No on
3	preconsidered Resos 315, 316, 317, Intro 214-A,
4	236-A, 23 M 173 and Reso 329. Vote Aye on all the
5	rest, and thank our great staff for all the work
6	they've done. Thank you.

8	COUNCIL MEMBER VAN BRAMER:
9	Permission to explain my vote?
10	COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Yes.

18	Council a very pleasant one. People have reached
19	out to be helpful where I need it. And I finally
20	learned what an on time budget feels like. I had
21	a couple of them along the way, but it's been a
22	while. And I do want to thank them all.
23	I do want to makeas a son of
24	former retired schoolteacherjust acknowledge the

teachers in this city. They sometimes get lost in

the shuffle here a little bit. They took no pay raise this year. They have no pay raise this year and they took a lot of crap in a lot of different places, in the course of a lot of discussions going on, not only in this state but across the country. In addition we had a cut; made the difficult choice of cutting Teachers' Choice, which is the money allocated by teachers to pay for books and for extra supplies in classrooms. So many of these teachers pay out of their own pockets so much money and don't get reimbursed. I really think they deserve a little bit of a shout out there.

As far as disclosures go, I have to disclose I have a sister-in-law who works at Queensborough Community College, which receives funding through CUNY; and I also have two children in the New York City Public Schools, which receive money through the Department of Education. 7	first budget. Very, very interesting. I did
8	first though want to thank and congratulate
9	everyone who was involved, although I disagree
10	with how some of it turned out. I did see that
11	many people worked very, very hard to make this
12	happen. And I was debating which way to go,
13	because as I said, some things were tough in
14	there.
15	But, you know, I think we saved
16	some thing, and we didn't save some others. And I
17	think there were some other options that weren't
18	explored, and I hope we explore the in the future.
19	Also, I've spoken to a lot of people. And while I
20	think this budget wasn't as bad as it could have
21	been, which I'm happy about, it could have been a
22	little bit better. As I spoke to people, people
23	are also frustrated about the paradigm and

17	a member stands up and says he would like to
18	associate himself with the remarks of someone,
19	it's usually another member; but today I'd like to

24	essentially cross-examined Mark Page. It was a
25	brilliant dissertation by me, and I ask that you

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: It's not called Crosswalks anymore.

COUNCIL MEMBER ODDO: Whatever.

COUNCIL MEMBER ULRICH:

[Interposing] I take back everything I said before. Thank you very much.

COUNCIL MEMBER ODDO: I have five minutes; I have to stretch this. The point is, on a serious note, that unless we get to the heart of the matter of what is driving these multibilliondollar deficits, those of us that have limited time here, and even those of our successors, will always have to deal with the pressures of threats to firehouses and senior centers. And we continue to have a structural imbalance in the City of New York. We continue to have more recurring expenses than recurring revenue, and that is a challenge for us. And I hope we don't lose sight of that, despite passing what I think, under the conditions, is a responsible budget. So I would be remiss if I didn't stand up here and drive that point home. I think it's my obligation as the Minority Leader.

Another general point I'd like to
make is that I was a staff member in this body for
seven years; it was a great seven years. And I
have a tremendous amount of respect for all of the
staff that works here. They work tirelessly.
They take lots of our frustration and aggravation.
And I'm so proud of all of them. The Finance
staff, particularly this time of year, I want you
to know you are respected. You are liked. 15 of
the 20-some odd members in the Budget Negotiating
found it in their hearts to help feed these guys.
Next years, that should be 51 members who find a
way to show, in a very small way, some respect and
get these people some decent food, who work day in
and day out.

You know, I heard the word compassion used, and I know Charles Barron is upset about cuts, and other members are. And I respect their concerns. But I have a privileged view of this budget process. The Speaker, as Councilman Ignizio pointed out, allows a Republican into the inner chamber. And there was a moment a couple of days ago, late in this process, where we've done a lot of work to reduce

the number. And we're at that point where you're literally shifting a few dollars here, a few dollars there. And we were throwing some numbers around and Christine said, okay. Because at that point you kind of go where the money is. And then she said, no; I can't do that to the kids. And it was a human moment, and it was a moment that her critics and the critics of this institution will not see. And I was there and I got to see it.

And I made a comment to Preston and I made a comment to the speaker that I was glad and privileged to be in that room to see it.

We understand that these numbers are not just numbers in a ledger--that these are people. And she, and the leadership team did the best they could to balance the pain. And I was proud of that entire leadership team. And I will close on this note. Last year, the community, Jimmy Vacca, others, people of Staten Island, really were the driving force, I think, behind saving the firehouses. This year there was a different dynamic to the budget. And I will, and I have, and I will continue, to make the world know that it was this City Council that put every

dime back. It was this speaker who willed these 20 companies. And I disagree with Charles Barron. Those 20 companies were in jeopardy, and it's a fight that's going to continue. That's how real it is. But I want the world to know that it wasn't splitsies [phonetic]. It wasn't 50-50. It was this Council who ate a big chunk of our money because this Speaker understands that this Department is not too big, and this Department is on the cutting edge of protecting this City.

I want everybody to take a good look around. I'm not sure if we'll ever be back in this building. It's construction; it's New York City. But on a serious note, life changes on a dime. I didn't think I was going to be here for my 11th budget. I am. I'm grateful. But everybody sort of take in this moment for five seconds; this is a good body. We have some warts, we have some self-inflicted wounds, but this is a good body. And Karen Koslowitz sees the old body to the new body; not that the old body was bad-she gets it. Mark Weprin mentioned it. Vinnie Ignizio mentioned it, vis-à-vis upstate. This is a good body and I'm proud of it. I will vote Yes

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on all, with the exception of 214-a, which is a no; Preconsidered SLR 13 is a no; Preconsidered Resos 315 and 316; M 173 and accompanying Reso 329, which are Nos. And I will abstain on Intro 210. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you very much. I also just want to echo the remarks of my colleagues here in the chambers in thanking our Speaker, Christine Quinn; in thanking our Finance Chair, Domenic Recchia; Chuck and Ramon; Preston and Jeff; the entire Finance staff for staying hours upon hours, sometimes until 4:00 in the morning, making sure that we have a budget that's sound, and making sure that we know where every single dollar is going. I want to thank the Dean of my Delegation in the Bronx, Annabel Palma, for her leadership in making sure that our delegation was run effectively and efficiently during this tough budget time. And I also want to thank the advocates and the activists who were out there every single day making sure that we members understand what these restorations mean to New

Yorkers and to the City of New York. We literally were bombarded, giving, you know, documents and information on paper from our Finance division to the activists. And my request at this point, since we are finalizing this budget--recycle, recycle, recycle. With that being said, I vote Aye on all. If you didn't get the little joke, it means that there was a lot of paper distributed, and I hope we all recycle it. There are trees being torn down in the Amazon. With that, I vote Aye on this budget. Thank you very much. It's a budget well done.
