MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Today's land use call ups, we have a vote of 35 in the affirmative and zero negative. We will now have communication from Speaker Cory Johnson.

SPEAKER JOHNSON: Good afternoon. you, Madam Majority Leader. Welcome to today's Stated Meeting. Before I start, I would like to remind all of the members that are present here today that masks are required to be worn throughout the Stated Meaning, even when speaking. Let's do our best to protect each other and all New Yorkers as we continue to battle this pandemic. Today, we are voting on five bills to help strengthen our city, including one to expand access to primary health care and another to offer more mental health services to our veterans. As always, I am proud of those Council for tackling some of our city's biggest challenges. Like everyone here, I watched in horror last week as the remnants of hurricane Ida devastated our city. These are communities we all represent and find it so hard to protect. We lost 13 New Yorkers. Friends, neighbors, colleagues, and a child. It was another tragic reminder that we are in a climate crisis and most tomorrow to prepare our city for the extreme

weather that we have been experiencing. The lives of New Yorkers are at stake. As we do at every stated meeting, I want to acknowledge some new sad 9/11 related deaths. On August 22nd, we lost retired FDNY Lieutenant Patrick Whalen. He was 62 on. On August 24th, we lost retired firefighter Stephen Riley. He was 68 years old. I include these deaths at each stated because it is vital to remember that our city's suffering and sacrifice did not end on September 11th, 2001. Let's have a moment of silence for the 13 New Yorkers and their families who are coping with so much grief after hurricane Ida and also for Lieutenant Whalen and firefighter Riley. If people could arise for a moment of silence?

Thank you. This Saturday, as everyone knows, will mark 20 years since that life altering day on 911 2001. Our resilience was tested as a week-old with the shock of the terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center in lower Manhattan. 2753 people were killed that day. These were workers, visitors, and first responders who started the day like many of us, expecting to return home safely. We will always remember them and continue to pray for their families, but the pain we felt that day is also

a reminder of our city's ability to rebuild and persevere, despite so much suffering. Our strength has been tested time and time again, including our ongoing battle against COVID 19. As of September 7th, 33,914 New Yorkers have died from the coronavirus. Our city has endured a lot of tragedy in our history, but has always triumphed. No one should doubt our ability to work however and remain the greatest city in the world. Time and again, we have shown the world the meaning of strength and grace in the face of challenges. I am deeply proud, as I know all of you are, to represent the city and I am proud to work with all of you to make it better for all New Yorkers. So, again, let us, again, people could rise, pause for a moment of silence for those who we lost in the 9/11 attacks 20 years ago. Thank you.

I want to wish all who celebrated Rosh
Hashanah L'Shana Tova. A happy, sweet, healthy, and
prosperous new year. May the year 5782 bring joy to
all those who celebrate and I want to wish all who
observe Yom Kippur and easy and meaningful for us
next week. I am so proud that our city has so many
people of Jewish faith in it. People who have come

SPEAKER JOHNSON: Hopefully, she's watching somewhere. Thank you, Jen. Really, really, really appreciate it.

Now, let's dive into our legislative agenda. The first bill comes out of the Committee on Technology edited is sponsored by Council member Peter Koo. Introduction number 1151-A will ensure that people and businesses won't incur late fees or interest on payments if an electronic system failure disables phase city website used to make online payments. This bill would establish a 48 hour grace period for a system failure that lasted 24 hours or longer, during which neither late payment fees, nor interest should be incurred for any payment due during the time period of the system failure.

Affected city agencies would also have the discretion to extend to the grace period by up to seven days,

We're also voting on Introduction number 1828-A, sponsored by Council member Alicka Ampry-Samuel and those bill comes out of the Committee camp women in Gender Equity. Sadly, New York State is considered a hot bed-- I mean, it's hard to even understand this -- It's considered a hot bed for the practice of female genital mutilation and cutting, defined by the World Health Organization as all procedures that involve partial or total removal of the external female genitalia or other injury to female genital organs for nonmedical reasons. legislation establishes an advisory committee on female genital mutilation and cutting led by their Mayors Office and domestic and gender-based violence with an aim of issuing recommendations to better engage communities and agencies to decrease the prevalence of and eventually eliminate the practice of female genital mutilation and cutting in New York City. The advisory committee would also be tasked with identifying supportive community based and culturally responsive resources for people who have undergone female genital mutilation and cutting.

Next is a bill from the Committee on Veterans, sponsored by Council member Mathieu Eugene, which will create peers support services for veterans. Introduction number 0647-a will require the Department of Veterans Services in partnership with local veterans service organizations to establish a telephone hotline to provide your support services and information to veterans. Additionally, the bill requires the hotline to be staffed by certified veteran. Specialists. The veteran peers specialists will provide counseling and referral services for callers. The Department of Veteran Services will be required to post the peers support hotline telephone number and hours of operation on its website. And, from the staff, I want to thank Bianca Vitali.

Our final bills from the Committee on

Health and it will help us expand healthcare access

for uninsured New Yorkers. According to the 2018

community health survey conducted by the Department

of Health and Mental Hygiene, roughly 12 percent of

2 the cities residents don't have health insurance. Unfortunately, uninsured New Yorkers are less likely 3 4 to get needed preventative care. Introduction number 5 1668-A, sponsored by myself and our Health Committee 6 Chair, Council member Mark Levine, aims at broadening 7 access to primary care services in New York City. The bill will develop and manage a primary care 8 services and patient navigation program which would 9 10 provide primary care services and applicable patient navigator services to ensure medical services are 11 provided in every community district. It also 12 requires that at least one participating in a cute 13 14 care hospital provides specialties services. 15 that is provided in each borough. Under the 16 legislation services that will be provided by Health and Hospitals Facilities, federally qualified health 17 18 centers, and other nonprofits and private medical 19 providers, the bill will also require the Health Access program to offer a telemedicine service 20 providing access for patients 24 hours a day, seven 21 22 days a week. I've been working on this bill for the 23 last seven years and I really, really want to thank Louis Cholden Brown who has been with me the entire 24 25 He has worked on this bill day in and day out time.

the last seven years. He is studying incredible job
and I'm really grateful to Louis for his partnership
with it. Louis, I want to thank you for everything
you have done everything you always do. I want to
thank him for the partnership he has had with Council
member Levine in Council member Levine's staff. I
also want to think Harbani Ahuja and Sara Liss. So,
that This is an important bill. This bill is
going to help hundreds of thousands of New Yorkers
who currently are underinsured and don't have primary
care access across New York City until Louisville
place that is near a Helping Hospital facility. So,
this is really a game changer for undocumented New
Yorkers, low income New Yorkers, New Yorkers who
don't qualify for health insurance. It's a really,
really big deal. So, that is our legislative agenda.
And, with back, I turn it back over to you, Madam
Majority Leader.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you so much,
Speaker Johnson. We will now call on Council member
Mark Levine to speak on his bill followed by Council
member Alicka Ampry-Samuel and then followed by
Council member Koo.

pandemic has laid bare the horrible cost of healthcare inequality in this city and there is no more devastating sign of that inequality then the fact that 600,000 New Yorkers move life without the basic security of health insurance meaning that they seek often primary care in the emergency room when they are in crisis which is the worst result for them and our healthcare system. There is a better way and the city has a program known as NYC Care that offers a very promising model to give people who lack insurance home for their primary care, Dr. to get

2	their annual physical, to get their vaccinations,
3	their preventative screenings, referrals to
4	specialists, help with prescriptions, ophthalmology
5	and other services offered on a sliding scale
6	available but anyone regardless of immigration
7	status. Both the program as it exists today has a
8	very serious limitation period it is only available
9	at Health and Hospital facilities and we love H&H,

13	facility and thousands of undocumented people,
14	thousands of uninsured people living there. This

16	has access to one primary care facility by activating
17	our wonderful FQHC's or community healthcare
18	facilities that are present throughout the city.
19	This will be a game changer for the uninsured and the
20	undocumented. Could I have time just to thank staff,
21	Madam Majority Leader?

forward, I became a newly elected member of the New York City Council and I was approved on major female genital mutilation issues right here in New York City. But, here in New York City, young women are more silent, isolated, and continue to not have a voice about their bodies which is pretty ironic because this is New York City. Quite often, the practice of FGMC leads to depression, swelling, urinary problems, reproductive issues, and possibly death. Many women have reached out for help and advocacy related to health education in the schools and in the hospitals and they ask for resources to assist with community level outreach again here in New York City. Some are trying to escape genital mutilation of their daughters and some are just seeking comfort in their communities. Ironically, although rising in New York City, female genital mutilation is prohibited in many African and Middle Eastern countries around the world, but they still practice it. So, today, we are working with the Mayor's Office to end domestic violence and genderbased violence with community activists like Fatima, legal advocacy groups, legal experts like Natasha Johnson with Globalizing Gender, and the women who

have come forward to share their own personal						
stories. So, today, we are acting just two more						
seconds. Today, we are acting to employee						
preventative measures to protect women and girls who						
call New York City home while still preserving some						
of their cultural practices that speak to good health						
and prosperity. And, with that, what to thank						
everyone who had a hand in helping with this bill and						
end female genital mutilation everywhere and for						
good. Thank you.

Leader, and hello everyone. Today, we voting on my bill, Intro 1152 to create a grace period if a city payment system goes down. Systems were down in any government services is supposed through computers were halted. This bill aims to protect New Yorkers from unjust

fees and fines in the event of such an attack here in						
New York City. As more of our society most online						
payments, we need to make sure there are protections						
in place Donald Lee to ensure the privacy of the						
information, but to safeguard against potential						
system outages. So this bill will establish a 48						
hour grace period for any system failure that						
disables the city website used to make online						
payments for a day or two. There will be no way						
payment fees nor interest incurred during that time.						
Additionally, city agencies will have the option to						
extend the grace period by up to seven days if						
needed. This accommodation is more than just a						
common courtesy that will make the lives of New						
Yorkers easier. It's simply the right thing to do.						
I want to thank Speaker Johnson, technology Chair						
Holden, Irene Bahalfski, Charles Keen, Chris Sartori,						
Jeff Baker, and Jason Goldman and the entire						
Technology Committee and staff for their work on this						
bill and I encourage my colleagues to vote in favor.

them as undocumented or have working papers or have

already have the support of New York State NAACP, the
house of Justice, Brooklyn Borough President,
Manhattan Borough President, Browns Borough
President, and many in the immigration [inaudible
00:53:22] and more than 55 institutions that they
have said New York City has to be progressive by
action. So I hope that at a moment when we have veto
power, we not only will hold this hearing, but we
also will take this bill to the vote and make by
example making New York City the largest municipality
that should be following other cities that already
have reestablished their rights of individuals with
working papers and immigration and green cards to
vote in the local election. Let's make history.
Let's say presente. Let's pass this bill. Thank
you.
