Res. No. 133

Resolution supporting the concept of the Underground Railroad Curriculum, a culturally relevant and inspiring educational tool that educates students about the contributions, accomplishments and struggles of African Americans.

Whereas, It is the duty of the New York City Department of Education to educate and inspire students of

all ancestries; and

Whereas, According to the New York City Department of Education, African American students constitute over one third of the students in the New York City public school system; and

Whereas, According to Black New Yorkers for Educational Excellence, there is no curriculum in place

in New York City schools that teaches black history in a systematic manner; and

Whereas, The lack of adequate incorporation of black history in the New York City school curriculum overlooks a crucial aspect of the history of the United States and minimizes the accomplishments, contributions and struggles of African Americans; and

Whereas, Neglecting black history in our schools is a disservice to all New York City students, but above all, is damaging to the well being of African American students and their communal and individual selfawareness; and

Whereas, There is a need for New York City schools to emphasize the significance of black history, most notably the African American battle to overcome racial inequality that spawned the American Civil Rights movement, one of the most significant social and political advancements of US history; and

Whereas, The Underground Railroad Curriculum seeks to establish equity with respect to the current

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cultural imbalance in the education of New York City students; and

Whereas, The New York State Legislature and the United States Congress have both mandated the incorporation of the Underground Railroad Curriculum for students; and

Whereas, Implementation of the Underground Railroad Curriculum will foster and promote a more culturally sensitive learning environment for students, and bestow upon the African American community much needed recognition of the importance of black history by New York City's educational institutions; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Council of the City of New York supports the concept of the Underground Railroad Curriculum, a culturally relevant and inspiring educational tool that educates students about the contributions, accomplishments and struggles of African Americans.
